Some of the passengers on board wished to make connection with the Boston train from the city in the evening, and became considerably agitated lest they should miss their train but the steamer made a fast trip and they were able to make connections.

Colleagues of Col. George Ham of the C.P.R., gave a banquet to him on Thursday night in Montreal in honor of his seventieth birthday anniversary. Many of the officials of the company told of Col. Ham's excellent service and of the characteristics which had made him a host of friends. Colonel Ham gave several interesting reminiscences of his early career. The gathering was joined by officials of the Michigan Central, who were visiting Montreal. C. E. Ussher presided.

Death of Child.
Bernice Claire, little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold M. Young, passed away Monday at her home, Charlotte street, after an illness with spinal meningitis. She was aged six years and seven months. She is survived by her parents and four sisters, Rhoda, Grace, Phyllis and Marguerite, all at home. A short service will be conducted at the home this afternoon by Rev. J. S. Sutherland after which the body will be taken to Taymouth for burial. The funeral service at Taymouth will be conducted at 2 p. m. Wednesday by Rev. Mr. McPherson.

Died in Victoria Hospital.
Mrs. Mary M. Morris died yesterday in Victoria Hospital aged twenty-nine years. The deceased was the wife of Benjamin H. Morris, of the 140th Battalion, now overseas, and a daughter of Charles Labelle, formerly of McGivney Junction. She was a native of Jacques River. The funeral service will be conducted at St. Dunstan's church at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning by Rev. Father Carney. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

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SOLDIER WHEN
ATTACKED USED
KNIFE ON ENEMY

Gordon Robinson Stabbed Saturday Night at Doaktown—Public Opinion with Soldier.

Gordon Robinson, who lives about two miles out of Doaktown, was stabbed Saturday night on the platform of the C.G.R. station at Doaktown by James Parker, a soldier belonging to a unit now in camp at Valcartier. The stabbing was the result of insulting remarks made by Robinson to Parker and his wife. The cut was a deep one and Robinson was placed under medical care. According to latest reports he will recover.

Parker was despatched from Valcartier to Doaktown to arrest and bring back an absentee named Berton O'Donnell, belonging to the same unit, who had overstayed leave. With the assistance of Constable Chipman Bartlett he got the man. Saturday night the two soldiers and their wives were standing on the station platform, the two men intending to take the train. Robinson approached and made insulting remarks and offered violence to Parker. The latter drew a revolver on Robinson but returned it to his pocket. He then drew a clasp knife and stabbed his assailant. The train was pulling out and the soldiers boarded it and left.

Public sympathy in Doaktown is all on the side of the soldier who was performing his duty as escort to a prisoner and who was interfered with.

ST. JOHN POLICE
ALSO WANT MAN
WANTED HERE

C. A. Bancroft, Bangor, Me., His Signature on Hotel Register—Stole Horse and Carriage.

The Fredericton police have been asked by the St. John authorities to look out for a man wanted for the theft of a horse and carriage from M. Albert Kindred of West St. John. Yesterday afternoon the St. John police gave a description of the man and it tallied exactly with that of the man wanted here for the robbery at the Ferris Hotel, Saturday morning.

It has been learned that this man registered at the Barker House Friday evening as C. A. Bancroft of Bangor, Me., stating that he had come by motor. His appearance bore out the statement. After getting dinner he left the hotel, taking his room key and not paying his bill. It was Friday morning that he left St. John with the horse and carriage. It is believed that he sold them as he showed a considerable amount of money here.

Nothing has been heard about this man since yesterday. He was traced as far as Caribou, Me.

At St. John on Thursday the same man hired a horse from Mr. John Glynn and left it at St. Martins where it was afterward secured.

Death at Douglas.
