food production and that every class  
of people and portion of the province  
should lend their energies to accom-  
plish so desirable a purpose."Therefore be it resolved, that own-  
ers of vacant lots in cities and towns  
and commercial and industrial workers  
there be earnestly requested to co-  
operate in their respective communi-  
ties in the highest degree possible in  
the cultivation of the greatest amount  
possible."

While the report of the nominating  
committee was being awaited, Dr. J.  
W. Robertson of Ottawa was called on  
for an address. As he was to be the  
chief speaker of the evening, he made  
but a brief speech, the main point of  
which was that a world-wide shortage  
in foodstuffs made a campaign for in-  
creased production necessary.**Seed Situation.**Hon. J. P. Tweeddale, Minister of  
Agriculture, made a short address ex-  
plaining the situation with regard to  
the seed shortage and the efforts made  
by his department to relieve it. He  
regretted that there was no prospect of  
seed wheat being secured. One order  
of the government had been cancelled.  
Sir George E. Foster had been asked  
to commandeer wheat from the ele-  
vator at St. John, but none had been  
secured from that source.Hon. Mr. Tweeddale said that the in-  
creasing cultivation of barley in New  
Brunswick, instead of buckwheat, was  
an excellent departure, as barley was  
a surer crop than buckwheat and a  
better feed for stock.Short addresses also were delivered  
by Mr. W. R. Reek, Secretary of Agri-  
culture, Miss Hazel Winter, Supervisor  
of Women's Institutes, Mr. F. A. Dyke-  
man of St. John, Rev. Father Guertin,  
of St. Joseph's, Mr. James Gilchrist,  
Dominion Immigration Commissioner,  
Mr. A. G. Dickson, of Chatham, Mr.  
C. Alward, of Petitcodiac, and Rev. J.  
J. Colter, of Fredericton.A suggestion from Premier Foster  
that the farmers present give sugges-  
tions of means whereby they could be  
helped, particularly in the way of capi-  
tal, produced an interesting discus-  
sion.**Views of Women.**It was suggested that representa-  
tives of some of the women's associa-  
tions be heard. Mrs. J. W. V. Lawlor,  
president of the Housewives' League,  
of St. John, expressed some original  
ideas. She strongly condemned the  
waste which goes on continually where-  
ever male cooks are employed in the  
army. If this were lessened, increas-  
ed production would not be as press-  
ing a problem. Mrs. Lawlor dealt also  
with the question of high prices. The  
farmer who is asked to produce more  
often compelled the consumer to pay  
the top price for an inferior article of  
food. Another factor which would aid  
in the campaign was governmental ac-  
tion against the food combine.Mrs. Gray, of Florenceville, also was  
heard. She suggested that prison labor  
might be used on the farms. Person-  
ally she felt that many mothers would  
hesitate to allow their boys to work on


