Their violation means a greater loss to you than to others because this is your sport.

If your record is good, what will you do this year to force guilty persons to understand that they are threatening the existence of your sport?

The deputy warden is working for your interest. He is your servant but will appreciate your help. His interests should be your interests.

A good many hunters think that violating the Fish and Game Laws and getting away with it is part of the game. The more you think this over, we believe the less willing you will be to subscribe to this doctrine.

Don't shoot until you clearly see your game, and not even then unless you have your partner located.

The only safe gun is one apart in your case. You can't be too careful with it at any time.

Every square mile burned over means a great loss to the country. It means less shooting ground for game.

Report a fire to the nearest warden. Help fight it. It destroys the hunting grounds and the game.

Make sure it's a lawful head. It may be a cow—or a man; how would you feel?

Leave a clean camp and a clean record; you may want to come back.

Remember that by shielding the poacher you put a premium on his dirty work.

"The best sportsman and hunter is the man who finds the most game, kills the least, and leaves behind him no wounded animal." Be a sport!

Remember this is a lean year. Remember the meatless days and waste nothing. Bring it all out. If you don't want it somebody else would be glad to get it.

KORNILOFF DECLARED A TRAITOR

Petrograd, Sept. 12. — The text of the communication of the workmen's, soldiers' and peasants' organizations to the army at the front, to the naval commission and the army generally, in which all are urged to rally round them, not only the mass of soldiers, but those in command of the army in support of the provisional government says: "General Korniloff, having put himself at the head of a military counter-revolutionary conspiracy, has moved troops toward Petrograd. His purpose is the deposition of the provisional government and the seizure of its powers. The troops directed to Petrograd have been deceived into believing that they are sent to crush a conspiracy of the Maximalists, which is non-existent in reality."

The communication then tells of Korniloff's dismissal and declares him a traitor, and adds: "The problem of the army commission to maintain the provisional government, to frustrate the criminal designs of General Korniloff and to apply all measures to prevent his conspiracy from reflecting its

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RUMOR THAT KERENSKY HAS BEEN KILLED

London, Sept. 12. — The Swedish Aftenbladet, says the correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company at Copenhagen, publishes a rumor emanating from persons who have arrived at the Swedish capital from Petrograd that Premier Kerensky has been killed by a member of the Bolsheviks. The rumor could not be confirmed.

WILL APPOINT MEDICAL BOARD

Ottawa, Sept. 12. — The Military Service Council has had a conference with the military authorities and it is proposed to have medical boards, under the military service act, appointed and instructed by the militia department. The boards will examine and certify the physical condition of the men coming within their scope of their work called out by proclamation. They will sit at each centre. Submission for examination, within the time limited for application for exemption, will be voluntary.

We print in this announcement a list of the states showing the great progress that Prohibition had made on its own merits in the United States before the Union entered the war. In connection with that list we want you to see what is the view of a business man's periodical devoted to commercial, economical and other financial questions (The Analyst, New York). Its Kansas correspondent writes:

"To-day the argument for Prohibition is simple and direct—namely, that human experience and medical research and experimentation have showed beyond doubt that alcohol is a poison, and that in its toxic qualities and effects it differs in degree, and not in kind, from cocaine and opium. This conviction is the strength and support of Prohibition, and the cause of its uninterrupted progress. It is clearly seen to be an economic measure rather than one of morals only."

"All the pleas and arguments of personal liberty, of the social delights of alcohol, of the charm it adds to life, of the employment it affords to thousands, seem futile and ineffective in the light of the fast-spreading belief that alcohol is the greatest known deterrent to economic efficiency. The fight against its use is no longer a matter of emotionalism, but of cold, calculating common sense."

A Comparison

Here is the plight of a large city still under license:

The result of alcohol is to breed vice and crime and to cause both mental and physical inefficiency among men. The license system has been a sickening failure. For a typical instance, listen to Governor Foss of Massachusetts: "In the last fifteen years (Boston) the arrests for drunkenness have increased from 18,000 to 57,000, 300 per cent. Over 60 per cent. of all the arrests in Boston are for drunkenness. It is very evident that our license system in Boston has increased drunkenness instead of checking it."

The Sheriff of Denver testifies for Prohibition, which went into effect there January 1st:

"We have about three-fifths the arrests we had formerly. The police court record for drunks and disturbances has fallen over forty per cent., the habitual loafer has disappeared, the can-rusher, the old soak who came home with a quarter in his pocket and sent his eight-year-old, ragged, barefoot girl to the saloon for a can of beer and then tossed her a crust of bread while he swigged the beer and snarled at her through his drunkenness, is no longer a resident of Denver."

Help to Enforce Prohibition
