# Sporting News

## FAST TIME AT SYRACUSE GRAND CIRCUIT MEET

St. Frisco Defeated Mabel Trask in Straight Heats—Royal Mac Took Empire Stake.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 11.—Making such remarkable time over the new state fair track, despite unfavorable weather conditions, that horsemen were astounded, St. Frisco, world's record trotting stalion, defeated Mabel Trask, Walter Cox's 'chestnut mare in three straight heats here today, taking the Battle Royal stake in 2:05½, 2:04½, 2:05½.

Mabel Trask, driven by Cox, gave Geers' great stallion a heart-breaking race in every heat, losing the first by a head, the second by a nose, and the third by so small a margin that the spectators did not know which to pick until the announcement was made.

The \$10,000 Empire State stake for 2:12 class trotters was won by Royal Mac, Murphy up, in two of three heats finishing third in the last encounter. Ima Jay was second and Busy's Lassie, big money winner of the year, third.

Nella Dillon trotted the fastest mile for two-year-olds over a Grand Circuit track thus far this year in the juvenile \$2,000 stake, winning handily in two straight heats. The time in the first heat was 2:08¾.

## HANK GOWDY SOME SERGEANT

Camp Mills, Sept. 10.—With this outfit is a sergeant. He is a tall, red-headed chap of soldierly appearance, has a keen eye and can handle a war club as well as a rifle. About a million baseball fans have seen him clout the ball for a homer and his bullet throws to bases are a matter of baseball history.

"Hank" Gowdy is his name and he appears happier in the uniform of Uncle Sam than in the baseball togs of the Boston Braves. Sergt. "Hank" now receives \$40 a month for his services and says he had rather have the government stipend than a World Series bonus.

The Boston catcher is captain of a team made up from the Ohio regiment.

## DUNN PROTESTS FORFEIT GAME

Chicago, Sept. 9. — Lee Fohl, manager of the Cleveland American League Baseball Club stated tonight he had made a report to James T. Dunn, president of the club, of today's game with Chicago, which was forfeited by Umpire Owens to the White Sox when catcher O'Neill threw the ball into centre field in the 10th inning with the score tied.

He declared that it was President Dunn's intention to protest the game on the ground that O'Neill's act was that of an individual player for which the entire team should not be penalized.

## PLAYERS FILE \$50,000 ACTION

John L. Lavan, shortstop of the St. Louis American League team, and Derrill B. Pratt, second baseman, have filed suit for \$50,000 each, against Philip De C. Ball, owner of the team, for alleged slanderous statements made in an interview given to a morning paper several days ago. In the interview Ball was quoted as saying that the players were "lying down." The suits refer to an interview given out by Ball after the game Tuesday between the St. Louis team and the Chicago team, which the Chicago team won 12 to 6. Before the game Wednesday three of the St. Louis players called on Ball and refused to play unless Ball agreed to retract the charge. This he did.
