The two have been detained by the authorities before at both Halifax and Amherst. It is probable that they will be sent back to Minto as both say they prefer working at Minto to returning to Amherst.

## Definitely Reported Killed.

Norman Goodine of this city, in response to a letter sent to Ottawa asking for definite information concerning his brother, Private Neils Goodine, reported missing in France some time ago, has been informed by Mr. Frank Beard of the Division of Records, acting for the adjutant general, that No. 445,588, Private Neils Goodine, is officially reported killed in action October 8th, 1916. The information was accompanied by a letter of sympathy from Hon. J. D. Hazen, Minister of Marine and Fisheries. The late Private Goodine left with the 55th Battalion and lately was transferred to the 43rd.

## New Arrangement.

During the next winter season, base duty men who report from overseas will be sent to their homes in apties which will be in charge of senior N. C. O's. Arrangements to this effect will be made by headquarters. In addition, a wire will be addressed to the reception committee in the neighborhoods which are the final destination of the respective parties, notifying the committees of the arrival of the returned men. This is intended so that necessary arrangements may be made to receive the returned soldiers. The parties will be under orders of the senior N. C. O's until the receptions are completed.

MET INFORMALLY  
THIS MORNING

M. G. Teed, K. C., of St. John, Conferred with J. J. McCaffrey—Awaiting Further Instructions.

The Board of Selection under the Military Service Act for the Province of New Brunswick met informally here this morning, Mr. M. G. Teed, K. C., of St. John, the government appointee coming here and meeting Mr. J. J. McCaffrey of this city, the appointee of the opposition.

Little was done beyond discussing the situation and laying general plans of action. The two members are awaiting the forwarding from Ottawa of official copies of the act and instructions concerning the districts into which the province will be divided. When these are received the appointment of tribunals will be proceeded with at once.

It is expected that the time in which the Board of Selection will have in which to act will be limited as the act is to go into force as soon as possible.

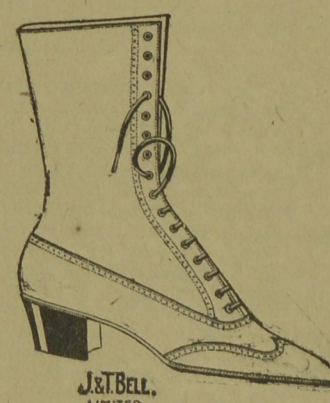
