PROVINCIAL COUNCIL, BOY SCOUTS, IN SESSION HERE

Prof. J. W. Stiles Retires From Presidency
 ---A. C. Skelton of St. John Succeeds---
 Interest in Organization Needs Stimulation--Nearly One Thousand Members in Province--Prof. Stiles to Attend Dominion Conference at Ottawa next week.

The New Brunswick Provincial Council, Boy Scouts, met here in annual session last night. Those present were President J. W. Stiles, Secretary C. A. MacVey, Treasurer F. Worrell, W. W. Hubbard and G. N. C. Hawkins, Fredericton; and A. C. Skelton, St. John.

President's Address.

In his annual report President Stiles reviewed the work done since the last meeting of the council in February, the work done since the last meeting of the council in February, 1916. He regretted that the people of New Brunswick were not taking the interest in the work of the Boy Scout organization that they should. The movement had been begun in New Brunswick in May, 1914, but since the outbreak of war there had been a steady falling off of interest in the organization due largely to the fact that the majority of scoutmasters had enlisted.

After the reading of the minutes of the last meeting, the secretary presented his report. The membership in New Brunswick was 889 scouts and 42 officers according to his statement. In Fredericton ten scoutmasters had enlisted. The treasurer's report was then read by Mr. Worrell.

Election of Officers.

The election of officers resulted as follows:

Patron, Hon. G. W. Ganong, Lieut. Governor.

Provincial Commissioner, L. H. Bliss, Fredericton, (re-elected).

Honorary President, Lt. Col. F. W. Wedderburn, (re-elected).

President, A. C. Skelton, St. John. Vice Presidents, Rev. H. A. Coyle, St. John; G. H. King, M.P.P., Chipman; Mr. Gregg, Pettediac; Hon. W. P. Jones, Woodstock.

President Skelton will appoint secretary and treasurer in St. John.

Business Transacted.

There was discussion concerning the matter of appointing a Maritime Secretary. The majority appeared to favor a New Brunswick secretary but the matter was left in the hands of the new president. The matter of finance also was left in the hands of President Skelton.

A letter from St. John to the effect that the troops in that city favored returning to the former minimum age limit of eleven years instead of twelve years, was read. Prof. Stiles, who will attend a Dominion conference at Ottawa next week, will try to have the former rule restored.

President Skelton was empowered to take up the matter of securing a life-saving medal for Walter Allen of St. John, who saved a person from drowning in West St. John, the second act of the kind which he has performed.

Prof. Stiles commenting on the fact that no central Boy Scout camp was held this year, stated that such a camp would do much to revive interest in the organization.

It was decided to do nothing toward promoting the Girl Guides' organization it being considered that the Boy Scouts would have difficulty enough in keeping active without added duties. The same was true of the Wolf Cub movement.

DAUGHTER SAW MOTHER APPEAR AT BEDSIDE

Presentiment That Mother Had Died Proved Correct--Mrs. S. E. Patchell's Case of Telepathy.

A curious case of telepathy comes from far-off Alaska, the recipient of the curious message being a nurse in Flat City Hospital in that territory, and the person from whom it came was her mother who died at home in Waasis, Sunbury county, a few miles from Fredericton.

Mrs. S. E. Patchell, formerly of Fredericton, was aware of the death of her mother, Mrs. Mary Wade of Waasis, before an obituary notice appeared in any local paper. As she slept in her room in Flat City Hospital on the night of May 24th last, her mother appeared at her bedside. Mrs. Patchell awoke and so great was the impression made upon her that she was unable to sleep again that night. She took the appearance as an indication that her mother had passed from this mortal world and marked down the date expecting certain confirmation of her presentiment.

CAR WENT OVER M'INTOSH BRIDGE LAST NIGHT

the western Liberal convention.

Unionist-Conservatives claim that if the Premier had definitely and decidedly entered into negotiations with representative western Liberal leaders and given them assurance that he was sincere, would do some necessary cleaning up, and would mobilize the entire resources of the nation in man and material power, instead of aimlessly pussy-footing and waiting for things to turn up and fall into his lap, he would have given Canada the one thing most necessary to consecrated national continuance in war winning.

Some of Side Currents.

There are, as in every crisis, side currents. Chief among these is the Rogers embroglio. There is a considerable faction of the Conservative membership, probably, in fact, as indicated by the recently largely signed testimonial, a majority who are

straight Rogerites. There is, however, a substantial minority who resent the dominance of Hon. "Bob" over the Premier, and will never forgive the latter for his complicity in the appointing of what is known here as the whitewash commission. There is likewise a small group who are deeply chagrined over the income tax proposals of Sir Thomas White, and the fact that men with substantial incomes are let off so easily.

The situation is quite acute. No organized steps have yet been taken, but the restive chagrin is amazingly general among Conservative members. They meet in the corridors and in their rooms and bitingly discuss their grievances.

They declare that there will be a "show down" with the Premier—that there must be one. Either Sir Robert must "get a graft on" and do something or he must quit. The insurgents talk of plain speech at the next party caucus. The impression seems to prevail, however, that things will come to a head as soon as the Premier starts to "reconstruct" his cabinet.
