Peter Schuyler, Favorite, Fin-
ished Outside the Money in
2.18 Trot—Miss Harris
M. Also Lost.

Columbus, O., Aug. 9. — Three reg-
ular events were raced today in addi-
tion to the unfinished 2.15 pace. Not
a single winner was forced to go an
extra heat to take down his purse.
There was a rather warm argument
in the free-for-all pace in the last
heat when Russel Boy's onrush made
Jamison touch Single G. with the whip
to win.

The stand saw two favorites lose
when Peter Schuyler, a favorite in the
2.18 trot, finished outside the money,
even, and Miss Harris M., second
choice early in the auctions, was bid
up to the favorite position before the
race started, only to drop the free-for-
all and finish third in her first start of
the year.

Lu Princeton, winner in the 2.15
trot, was a first choice. Peter G., in
the 2.15 pace, of which one heat was
raced Wednesday, kept on going good
today and won in straight heats.
