are luscious; and if we don't imitate
our country cousins by eating them
with vinegar and sugar for breakfast,
we will do no harm in including them
in at least one meal a day in some
guise.The woman who thinks of the food
possibilities of tomatoes simply in
terms of sliced raw tomatoes, or stewed
tomatoes, is a person of the past.
The good cook knows at least twenty
ways of making use of tomatoes.Just by way of refreshing your memory,
open a cook book to the section
on tomato cookery. If you are an expert
probably all you will need is just
simply to read the recipes, and then
go and perform your version of the
dish.**Baked Stuffed Tomatoes.**Be sure to refresh your memory on
the subject of baked stuffed tomatoes,
for they cannot be made from canned
tomatoes, and are necessarily a summer
dish.The tomatoes chosen should be firm
and smooth and of uniform size. They
should not be dead ripe, as they will
not then hold their shape when bak-
ing. Do not remove the skins, but
with a very sharp knife cut out all
imperfect spots as well as the hard
blossom end. With a spoon scoop out
the soft pulp and mix this in a dish
with breadcrumbs, salt, pepper and
butter. If you use sugar, use no more
than you do salt, as too much sugar
spoils the flavor of tomatoes. A very
little chopped onion is acceptable.Put the mixture back into the to-
matoes and top each off with a small cube
of bread. Place in a shallow pan and
bake carefully, so that they do not
dry out.**With Spanish Dressing.**This recipe from sunny Spain,
where the tomato season is long, and
where everyone appreciates this most
luscious of vegetables, is typical ofwhat any ingenious cook can do with
tomatoes as a salad basis. To make
it, peel, chill and slice the tomatoes.
Arrange them on a platter without
letting the slices lap over each other.
Have ready some chopped crisp young
onions, parsley and green peppers.
Mix this and place a spoonful of it on
each slice of tomato, and on top of
each sprinkling put a neat dab of
mayonnaise dressing. Garnish with
