Butter was scarce but what there was sold quickly at 40 cents per pound. Eggs brought 40 cents a dozen. New potatoes sold at 50 cents a peck. A few strawberries brought 25 cents a box and English brought 25 cents a box and English cherries 30 cents a box. Cucumbers sold at 5 cents each and beets, carrots and onions at 5 cents a bunch. Raspberries brought 40 cents a half pail and blueberries 15 cents a quart. Young pigs were quite plentiful a t\$5 each. Veal sold at 15 and 18 cents a pound and lamb at \$1.50 and \$2 per quarter.
