SCOTT ACT REPEAL WAS DISCUSSED LAST NIGHT

Hon. Robert J. Ritchie, Police Magistrate Of St. John and Rev. W. D. Wilson, Prohibition Inspector the Chief Speakers--- Electors Urged to Vote For Repeal on August 16th.

The mass meeting in the interests of the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in this city on August 16th, when a special election on the matter will take place, held in the Opera House last night was attended by several hundred people who heard excellent and impressive addresses. The principal speakers were Rev. W. D. Wilson of this city, Provincial Inspector under the Prohibition Act, and Hon. Robert J. Ritchie, police magistrate of St. John.

A number of those interested in temperance reform in this city were seated upon the platform. Among them were Ald. Judson Barker, W. G. Clark, W. M. Burns, J. J. Weddall, T. H. Colter, Howard Rogers and Ald. D. J. Shea. The chairman was Ald. J. M. Lemont.

Magistrate Ritchie of St. John was in fine form and in an address with many humorous touches told of the improved conditions which exist in the city of St. John as the result of the enactment of prohibitory legislation which came into effect in May last. Rev. Mr. Wilson dealt chiefly with the features of the Prohibition Act which made it superior to the Canada Temperance Act commonly called the Scott Act. He gave great credit to Hon. W. E. Foster, premier of the province, for absolute non-interference with the enforcement of the act or the appointment of officials under it.

Rev. Mr. Wilson made a strong appeal for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in Fredericton on the ground that the legislation of 1916 was much superior to the old act as far as the prevention of the sale of liquor was concerned as under it penalties were heavier for any infraction and cooperation between various sections of the country was more effective. He mentioned the scale of penalties under the new act, ranging from a fairly heavy fine for the first offense to one year's imprisonment for persistent violation.

Mr. Wilson cited the town of Campbellton which was under license until May 1st last when Prohibition came into effect. In that one town \$1,200 had been collected in fines and paid into the provincial treasury and the town made very dry. Premier Foster in spite of heavy pressure from various directions had kept his hands off as far as the Act was concerned, with the result that the success had been tremendous. (Applause.)

The speaker pointed out that the Act was not only a help to New Brunswick but also to the enforcement of the Prohibition legislation in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

He had lived twenty-five years in the Old Country—the Motherland which was facing the crisis of her existence. And he could say that she never would be defeated for she possessed an unconquerable soul. (Applause.) He did hope, however, that she could put away from her the horrible curse of liquor which had done her so great injury. As far as Canada was concerned, God grant that the boys when they returned, would come into a purer heritage.

Hon. Mr. Ritchie, in his introductory remarks, referred to the fact that on the last occasion he had spoken in Fredericton Rev. Dr. MacDonald had then been one of the speakers. It was strange that one could not come to Fredericton to speak without meeting a Baptist clergyman (laughter). He could not see why any thinking person could be opposed to the substitution in the place of the Scott Act of a better law which has made St. John what it is tonight—a dry town. (Applause.)

Some people favored a license Act such as was in force in St. John prior to May 1st, but it must be remembered that for every man who could use liquor there were a hundred who abused it. When ever a gap occurred in the ranks of the regiment of drunkards the moderate drinkers were called upon to fill the gap. Moderate drinking should not be encouraged. The Scott Act was a good act, if enforced; but when was it enforced?

On May 1st, 1917, there were eighty-five people in St. John jail. A month later there were twenty-seven. On Saturday last there were fourteen.

St. John might not be bone dry, but

it was pretty dry! A good many thirsty people hang around the street corners. (Laughter.)

The testimony of habitual drinkers in St. John was that the Prohibition Act was doing much for them. They were taking home their full pay envelopes instead of handing them over the bars. Those dealing in necessaries and comforts were selling goods and being paid the money which formerly went for rum.

"The prolific mother of hideous vices" was the name given to the liquor traffic by Hon. Mr. Ritchie. After prohibition had been tried for some years people would say "Why did we not think of this before?"

Ald. Lemont pointed out that for the meeting to have results every voter should go to the polls on August 16th and vote against the Scott Act. The ballot would have two sections, one in red ink, "against the act," one in black "for the act." Every man should mark his ballot in the red section.
