MacKenzie, officer commanding the 26th Battalion and Pioneer Lyon MacKenzie, of No. 1 Pioneer Battalion.

Major F. C. Jones Dead.

Many friends throughout the province will regret to learn of the death of Major Fred Caverhill Jones which occurred Saturday at Baltimore after an illness of several months. Major Jones was a veteran of the South African war and when the present war broke out he enlisted at the first opportunity and went to England as second in command of the 115th Battalion. While overseas he contracted an illness which necessitated his immediate return. He returned to Canada a short time ago and remained in St. John only a week, proceeding to Clifton Springs and thence to Baltimore for the sake of his health.

SEVEN YEARS IN
PENITENTIARY
FOR F. SMITH

Judge Wilson Imposed Sentence at Gagetown Saturday--Hampton Given Two Years.

At Gagetown on Saturday Judge Wilson of the Queens County Court imposed sentence on Frank Smith of this city, who previously had pleaded guilty to breaking and entering at Hampstead and also to breaking out of Queens County jail at Gagetown.

For the first offence Judge Wilson imposed a sentence of five years in Dorchester penitentiary, and for the second a sentence of two years in the same institution, the second sentence to come into effect on the expiration of the first. On the combined charges Smith was liable to a maximum of twenty years in penitentiary. He took the sentence very quietly.

Last year Smith was given a sentence of three years in penitentiary by Judge Jonah of the Kings County court for holding up a man at the muzzle of a revolver on the St. John and Quebec Railway construction work. At that time sentence was suspended on condition that Smith enlist, but enlistment was never carried out. On other occasions Smith had been dealt with leniently in spite of a long record as a wrong-doer. On the last occasion an attempt was made by Fredericton people to have the young fellow enlisted in the Royal Navy and taken away, but it was not successful.

St. John Youth Sentenced.

Earl Hampton, a young fellow belonging to West St. John, who was concerned with Smith in the break at Hampstead, was sentenced to two years in penitentiary, having pleaded guilty to the charge.

Case from Chipman.

James Parlee, arrested at Chipman on the charge of breaking and entering and stealing fifty dollars, pleaded not guilty before Judge Wilson and elected to be tried under the Speedy Trials Act. His case will be heard on Friday next.
