## ROYAL BANK'S RECORD IN OVERSEAS SERVICE

General Manager Neill on Moral Obli-  
gations Due to Those Who  
Have Served.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—Mr. C. E. Neill,  
general manager of the Royal Bank, at  
the annual meeting paid a touching tri-  
bute to the record of the men of the  
staff and the necessity of making spe-  
cial provision for them on their return.  
Mr. Neill said in part:

In thanking you on behalf of the staff  
I must first refer to those who are ab-  
sent on military duty. The number en-  
listed from our ranks is now 762, and  
we have heard of 92 casualties—45  
wounded, 18 killed or died of wounds,  
one missing and eight prisoners of war.  
I take this opportunity of expressing  
publicly our sense of loss, and our sym-  
pathy for the relatives of those who  
will not return.

To those who are fighting our battles  
unflinchingly in the midst of inconceiv-  
able hardships, we owe a heavy debt  
of gratitude; and we feel that this is  
realized by none more keenly than the  
men who bear the brunt of their depart-  
ure to a great extent. I refer to the  
many officers who are putting forth  
splendid efforts with unflinching cheer-  
fulness under increasing duties. It is  
not easy to conduct the business with-  
out so many of our trained men. The  
depleted ranks must be filled almost  
entirely by junior clerks and by girls  
without banking experience, and the  
labors of our trained men are thus in-  
tensified. The total number of girls  
employed on all posts has grown to 715.

In connection with the staff, one  
thing above all others must be borne  
in mind—our moral obligation to do the  
very best we can for our men return-  
ing from the front. This war is wear-  
ing down the fine fiber of our feelings  
in some respects, but it must not be  
allowed to dull our sensibilities that  
we could ever accept the sacrifices of  
our men as a matter of course. There  
are problems ahead of us in dealing  
with them as we wish to deal, but we  
are fully prepared to give the future of  
these men our most serious consider-  
ation.

## CANADA PUTS MILLIONS IN NATIONAL FACTORIES

Toronto, Jan. 15.—In an address be-  
fore the Women's Canadian Club yester-  
day, J. W. Flavell, chairman of the  
Imperial Munitions Board, empha-  
sized strongly the importance to  
the cause of the Allies of prompt de-  
livery of shells from Canada, and also  
paid a tribute to the efficiency of wo-  
men as munition workers. He also  
urged that every woman who had been  
brought up on the land should return to  
it in order to increase the food supply.

Authorized expenditures, he said, in-  
cluding those already made, totalled  
\$200,000,000, and operations had been  
carried on in 600 factories, located in  
every province, with the exception of  
Prince Edward Island. Over 400,000  
men and women were engaged in these  
factories. He added:

"We are at the moment constructing  
national factories for the manufacture  
of various munitions. One, commenced  
a few weeks ago, will cost \$2,230,000  
and another we hope to complete in  
thirty days, using 900 men in the build-  
ing, will cost about \$2,000,000. Another  
we decided to erect a few days ago, and  
which we hope to complete by mid-  
summer, is estimated to cost \$1,000,000.  
A series of factories in connection with  
the proposed establishment of aero-  
planes, will entail an expenditure  
of between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000."

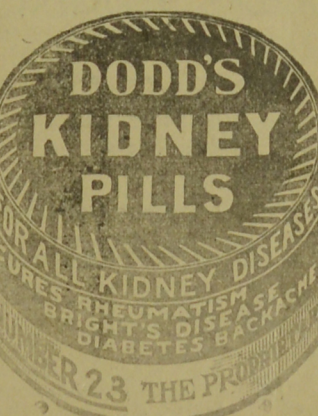
## A HOUSE DIVIDED AGAINST ITSELF

Brothers of Austrian Emperors are  
Doing Valiant Service in the  
Belgian Army.

Paris, Jan. 15.—Prince Sixtus of  
Bourbon de Parma and his brother,  
Prince Xavier, brothers of the Aus-  
trian Emperors, who are serving in the  
Belgian army, have been commended  
in the following terms:

"They spontaneously offered their  
services in the cause of right, and, at-  
tached to the section of stretcher bear-  
ers in the first line, have on all occa-  
sions given proof of devotion and com-  
plete contempt of danger. At the be-  
ginning of the war the two princes at-  
tempted to enlist in the French army,  
but could not be taken on account of  
the law excluding from the army all  
members of the former French family,  
whereupon they joined the Belgian  
forces."

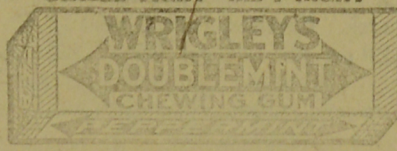
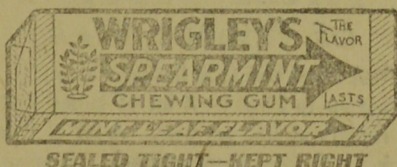
