CHILDREN'S AID WILL EXTEND OPERATIONS OUTSIDE THE CITY

Committee Appointed to Secure Matron For Intended Home and to Estimate Cost of Maintenance-- Kingsclear Case Considered

A meeting of the executive committee of the Children's Aid Society was held in the Mayor's Office last evening. In addition to business of a routine character, several matters of importance were considered.

Miss Cooper, agent, reported on the children already under the care and also on several cases which seemed to need the help of the society.

Appreciation was expressed of the kind offer of Mr. Archibald Fraser, to place the old Aberdeen mill boarding house in Woodstock road, or the part needed, at the disposal of the society for a children's home.

To Prepare the Home.

A committee consisting of Mrs. A. C. M. Lawson, Mrs. W. G. Clark and Miss Cooper was appointed to prepare an estimate of the cost of the proposed home, and to secure a matron for the home when it is opened.

Another committee, composed of Mr. J. J. Weddall, Dr. Kierstead, Mr. G. I. C. Hawkins, and the secretary, was appointed to provide ways and means of financing the home.

Dr. Kierstead was requested to investigate a claim for two children now in the Parish of Kingsclear. The liability of the municipality to provide for destitute children in the county outside of the city, is also to be looked into, as it was stated that parish officers in one instance had not given any encouragement that financial help

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BENCH WARRANT ISSUED FOR WITNESSES IN BROWN CASE

Court Adjourned This Morning When Marysville Girls Failed to Appear ---Prosecution Closed Case in One Count.

The case against Fred Brown on the charge of knowingly permitting a girl under 18 years to be on premises which he had charge, for immoral purposes, was not continued this morning on account of the absence of two girls belonging to Marysville who were wanted as witnesses. Mr. G. T. Feeney, who appeared as counsel for the defence, explained that the girls had no money with which to hire a horse to bring them from Marysville. His Honor Judge Wilson issued a bench warrant for the two witnesses and a sleigh was sent to bring them to court, which was adjourned until 2 p. m.

Case for Prosecution.

The case for the prosecution, for which Mr. H. G. Fenety, clerk of the court, is appearing, was completed yesterday afternoon. The witnesses were Policeman J. W. Sturgeon, Police Sergeant Charles Marshall, and Mrs. Margaret Tucker.

Mr. Feeney emphasized the fact that there were differences in the evidence of the police officers as given in the preliminary examination before Police Magistrate Limerick and as given before the county court. His Honor remarked that slight discrepancies were to be expected under the circumstances.

Contradicted Policemen.

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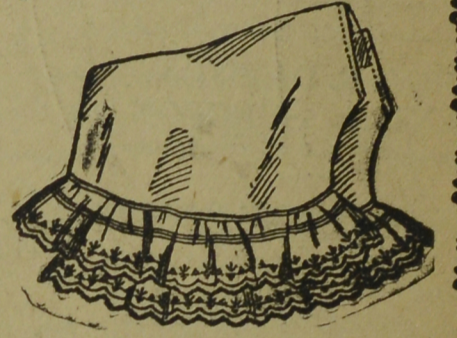
