CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY TO EXTEND ITS WORK

As reported in these columns some time ago, the Children's Aid Society are making plans for extending their work among the delinquent and dependent children of the city and county. The need of a home for the children has been much felt. Through the kindness and beneficence of Mr. Archibald Fraser, the Society is in a fair way to have such a home in the near future. Mr. Fraser has very kindly offered the society the use of the large building formerly used as a boarding house near the site of the old Aberdeen Mill, at the upper end of the city.

A committee of the society, consisting of Lady Ashburnham, Miss Cooper, Dr. Foster and the secretary, visited the building on Saturday and are of the opinion that with suitable superintendence for the home the society will in a short time be able to do very much more efficient work, although much still remains to be done before taking over the home. Furniture and equipment must be provided and funds to pay for these things will have to be found.

A number of generous donations have been made since it became known that the society was in need of funds to enable it to carry on its work, but more will be needed. The sympathy and assistance of the citizens solicited.

DYNAMITE, THE GIANT FARMER

(Farm and Fireside.)

On my farm we have found that there are many jobs which come along in the course of a year which the stored up power in a stick of dynamite will do quicker and cheaper than we could do ourselves. We have used many tons of it, and with few exceptions the results obtained have been excellent. There is little danger in the using of dynamite—in fact, absolutely no danger whatsoever, provided one first realizes that he is handling an explosive and then uses good, sound common sense.

When I came on the place I found a plot of about two acres off to the south from the house and barn. The soil was a rich loam, and it was getting all the drainage from my cow-yard and stables.

I believed that it would make a fine truck garden, but there were about 200 stumps on the lot. With the help of one man I started in to clean the lot with the use of dynamite. It took up three days, and the cost of the dynamite we used was in the neighborhood of \$30.

We followed the rule, "a pound of dynamite for every foot in the diameter of the stump, and in most cases the stump was removed with a single charge. On three or four stumps we used a double charge. The charge was in each case placed as directly under the stump as possible.

A few years ago I planted 300 apple trees and used powder for blowing the holes. Their growth has far surpassed some which were set in spade-dug holes at the same time. I have had to remove fruit from these trees every year to prevent their coming in to bearing too young.

A similar experience with grapevines has convinced me that trees and shrubs will do much better where the explosive is used either to make the holes for the original planting or, in case they are already planted, to break up the soil about the growing trees.

tion with the great struggle itself. But nothing will alter our thought or our purpose. We desire neither conquest or advantage. We wish nothing that can be had only at the cost of another people.

A Plea for Unity.

In conclusion the President said: The thing I shall count upon, the thing without which neither counsel nor action will avail, is the unity of America—an America united in feeling, in purpose and in its vision of duty, of opportunity and of service. We are to beware of all men who would turn the tasks and the necessities of the nation to their own private profit or use them for the building up of private power. Beware that no faction or disloyal intrigue break the harmony or embarrass the spirit of our people. Beware that our government be kept pure and incorrupt in all its parts.

REV. G. C. WARREN BEGAN PASTORATE YESTERDAY

Preached to Large Congregations at
Brunswick Street Baptist
Church.

Rev. Gordon Chester Warren, B.A., J.D., began his pastorate in the Brunswick Street Baptist Church yesterday under very favorable prospects. At both morning and evening services he preached to large and appreciative audiences.

Mr. Warren is a native of North River, P.E.I. He received his early training in the public schools of P. E. I., and at Prince of Wales College.

After some years of successful teaching he entered Acadia College, Wolfville, N.S., where he was graduated in 1910. At college he stood high as a student and was a leader in college activities. He was president of the college Y. M. C. A. in his senior year, and was a member of the debating team in his sophomore, junior and senior years. After graduating from Acadia he supplied during the vacation period the church at Point de Bute, N. B. From there he went to Newton Theological Institute, where he was graduated in 1912 with the degree of bachelor of divinity.

Since his graduation from Newton he has held pastorates in New Boston, N.H., and in Bridgetown, N. S.

As a speaker Mr. Warren is clear, logical and earnest and his message carries conviction to his hearers.

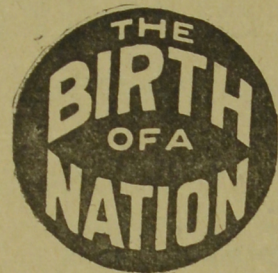
