WESTMORLAND'S STRONG TEAM.

The Sackville Tribune, in commenting on the recent session of the Legislature, pays a well deserved tribute to the five gentlemen who represent the county of Westmorland and city of Moncton. It says:

"The Hon. Dr. Smith, as Minister of Crown Lands of the Province, shows an activity which promises reform and a vigorous administration of his department in the interests of the people.

"Mr. Sweeney's earnest advocacy of increased remuneration for the underpaid school teachers was most creditable.

"The presentation of the provincial budget by the Hon. C. W. Robinson (in the illness of the Prov. Secretary) was a masterly performance. His illuminating analysis of New Brunswick's financial situation has elicited much favorable commendation.

"Mr. Leger's long legislative experience, together with his recognized ability and characteristic urbanity, have combined to make him a pronounced success as Deputy Speaker of the House.

"Mr. Magee's able contribution to the debates on the subjects of Crown Lands, Technical Education, Assistance to the Farmers and Maritime Union, have been gratifying evidence to the people of Eastern New Brunswick that he is a man of advanced and practical ideas, which can be promoted into action.

"It is well that the activities of Westmorland's Five are again directed to the public interests, rather than to the establishment of private monopoly such as oyster beds, or the white-washing of public corruptionists in high places."

Our bright Sackville contemporary does not overstate the case when it states that the activities of Messrs. Smith, Robinson, Leger, Sweeney and Magee were directed to the public interest. The people of Westmorland certainly have reason to be proud of the men who so worthily represent them in the Legislature. Westmorland's sturdy, industrious and good-looking members took a very prominent part in the work of the session, and rendered good service, not only to their own county, but to the whole province. Other counties which are unfortunately represented in the Legislature by grouchers and back numbers, sitting in the cool shades of opposition, have reason to be envious of the noble county of Westmorland.

The Liberal government of Saskatchewan, so ably led by Hon. W. M. Martin, was handsomely sustained at the polls yesterday. Although returns are not yet complete, it seems altogether likely that Premier Martin will have fifty supporters in a House of fifty-nine members. Premier Martin and all of his ministers, including Attorney General Turgeon, a New Brunswicker, were triumphantly re-elected. Opposition Leader Willoughby was re-elected in Qu'Appelle, but Mr. Bradshaw, his first lieutenant, met defeat in Prince Albert, a hitherto Tory stronghold. The result of the election is a great triumph for Premier Martin and shows that the firm hold which Liberalism has on the West has not in the least been loosened.

St. John Telegraph: The editor of the Chatham World hung up a drinking cup near the spring that flows beside the World office, that all might freely drink. Within two hours the cup was gone. The editor believes it was stolen, and says so. He says so loudly and offensively, as one having a grievance and anxious to let everybody know it. But after all, he still has the spring. It might have been worse. A railroad contractor came into this province a little while ago, and while he was fussing around after a contract under a perfectly honest government, he felt a sensation as of having parted with something; and when he looked to see, behold, he was shy \$125,000. Not that he complains. He says he is delighted. It might have been \$250,000. Instead of setting up a yell over the mere unexplained absence of a drinking cup, the editor of Chatham World ought to rejoice that his visitor left him the bubbling spring.

St. John Times: The Foster government is altogether unsatisfactory to the St. John Standard. That is a very good reason why it should be wholly satisfactory to the people. The provincial opposition delights the St. John Standard. That is a sufficient reason why the people should regard it with suspicion. One of the great merits of the Foster government is that it is bringing to light the political doings of some of the directors of the Standard and revealing to the people the facts they ought to know, but could not learn until there was a change of government. The revelations are by no means ended.

The St. Andrews Beacon announces that Mr. G. W. Ganong, ex-M.P., of St. Stephen, has been appointed to the Senate. The news, if authentic, will be somewhat disappointing to Mr. T. J. Carter, Mr. B. F. Smith and other Tory politicians who labored under the belief that their claims would have recognition from Minister Hazen.

The American "Liberty Loan" tabulations show that \$3,035,226,850 was subscribed, nearly 52 per cent. more than was required. Bonds were purchased by more than 4,000,000 persons. About 3,960,000 subscribed for bonds for amounts between \$50 and \$10,000, and to these purchasers bonds for the full amount ordered will be delivered. The 40,000 subscribers for bonds of larger denominations will receive allotments ranging from 60 per cent. of subscriptions between \$10,000 and \$100,000 to 20 per cent. of the largest subscriptions.

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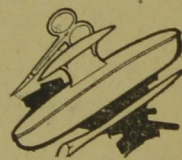
