LIGHTNING
WRECKED BARN
AT McLEOD HILL

Cattle Sheltered in Building Escaped Injury—Heaviest Electrical Storm of Summer.

The barns of Mr. William Seymour at McLeod Hill, about three miles from this city, were struck by lightning at about five o'clock this morning. The bolt practically demolished the building, tearing the roof and sides and smashing the heavy frame on which it was constructed. Mr. Seymour's cattle were in the building at the time it was struck and strange to say they were uninjured. The owner of the barn was insured against damage by lightning with Mr. M. Brewer of this city.

The damage at McLeod Hill was done during the heaviest electrical storm which has visited this section of the province this summer. There was very sharp lightning and heavy thunder but no damage beyond that mentioned is reported.

In the Police Court.

PRECAUTIONS
ARE TAKEN AT
LAKE GEORGE

Single Case of Smallpox is Under Quarantine—Vaccination of the Inhabitants Made.

Dr. R. H. McGrath, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, visited Lake George last night and saw that the necessary precautions for the isolation of the case of small-pox there had been taken. The man who had carried the disease from Maine also is under quarantine at Dumfries. He had the disease while in Bangor but has practically recovered from it.

The man at Lake George who took the small-pox had not been vaccinated. His mother who lived in the same house had and did not take the disease. The health authorities have had a general vaccination made of the people of Lake George who were much afraid of the disease, the community having suffered severely from it some years ago. The school there has been closed until the scare is over.

Dr. McGrath has been informed by the health authorities of the State of Maine that the small-pox outbreak which occurred in a number of lumber camps along the Upper Penobscot, is under control, no new cases having been reported within a week.

Silent Policemen.

"Silent Policemen" are to make an appearance in the streets of Fredericton at an early date. Ald. McLellan, chairman of the Roads and Streets committee, has ordered six. They were shipped from the factory at Gloucester, Mass., today. The "Silent Policemen" are of the nature of an experiment and will be used at the corners of Queen street where traffic is heaviest. They will be placed at the centre of the street intersections to show motorists and the drivers of all vehicles where turnings should be made. If knocked down they will right themselves.

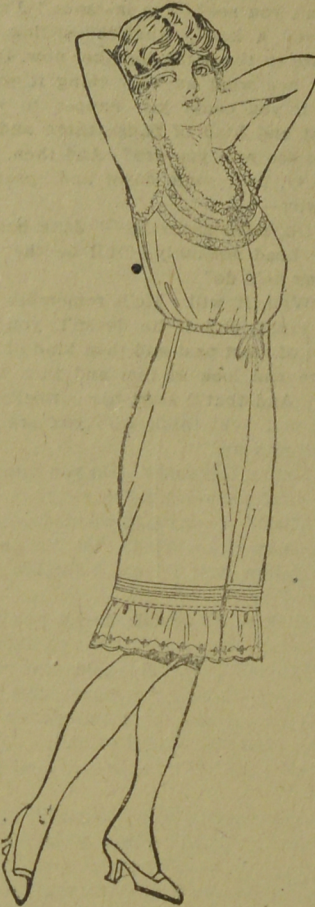
