UNIONISTS CELEBRATED VICTORY LAST NIGHT

Bonfire on Phoenix Square After Midnight
--Speeches at Headquarters by Col. H. F. McLeod, J. B. Daggett, Rev. A. D. McLeod and Mayor Mitchell.

The Unionist victory in York-Sunbury and all over the Dominion was celebrated quietly last night by the Unionist supporters of Fredericton. The principal reason why no great demonstration was organized was the lateness of the hour when it was definitely known the government had been sustained. It was after midnight when Mayor Mitchell was asked over the telephone for permission to build a bonfire in Phoenix Square and readily granted it.

The weather was very cold and raw and few people watched the bulletin boards. Both committee rooms were receiving the election returns and were crowded with interested citizens until after midnight. The first returns coming from the province of New Brunswick gave the Unionists a lead. Later figures from Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island showed that the Maritime Provinces had divided about evenly. When the Quebec results came over the wire the Liberals had the satisfaction of knowing that Sir Wilfrid had a comfortable lead and many of them went home believing that the Union government had been defeated. Still later returns showed that Ontario had done so poorly for the opposition that the lead in Quebec had been more than overcome. With the Western Provinces going almost solidly against Laurier all doubt of the result vanished.

While the returns were coming in there were calls for speeches and the Unionist candidate, Col. H. F. McLeod, Mr. J. B. Daggett, Rev. A. D. McLeod and Mayor Moses Mitchell responded.

Col. H. F. McLeod.

Col. McLeod was cheered as he entered the Unionist rooms. Speaking briefly he stated that the result of the election showed that the people of York-Sunbury would do the right thing when stirred by a patriotic issue. A few weeks before it seemed that throughout the rural districts of the two counties there was a pronounced feeling against the Military Service Act but when election day came the Laurier candidate who had made anti-conscription one of his canvasses carried but few parishes of the constituency. It was a contest in which no personalities had been indulged by those on the government side, only the issues of the day being presented, and there really had been but one issue. The city of Fredericton by defeating the Laurier candidate by twelve hundred votes had shown what the feeling of the people was and that party lines did not stand

in the way when a national issue was at stake. The result of the election all over Canada showed that the Dominion which had done so nobly in the great war was not going to desert the boys who had gone out to fight.

J. B. Daggett.

Mr. J. B. Daggett said that the result of the day's election had proven that Canada was in the war to the end. In York and Sunbury counties the vote had been overwhelming. The result throughout the Dominion had shown that the "spoiled child" of Confederation, Quebec, must take a spoiled child's punishment. Quebec had made her bed; let her lie upon it. The rest of the Dominion had decided and that decision had amounted to the referendum of which Laurier had talked. Canada could go ahead without Quebec. If the Union government could not handle the situation as it should be handled, the electorate which put it in could put it out. As far as the situation in the constituency was concerned, he hoped it meant that York county would no longer be tormented by Nelson Brown.

Rev. A. D. McLeod.

Rev. A. D. McLeod in his remarks stated that the hand of Providence, in his opinion, could be plainly seen in the result of the election. Canada had arrived at a crisis in her history and had taken the right course. The government returned to power must do the right and rule in accordance with the divine direction.

Mayor Mitchell.

His Worship Mayor Moses Mitchell, in response to repeated calls, made a brief address. As most of his hearers knew, he had been in the northern part of the province near the Quebec border for several months. He had returned to Fredericton on Saturday last and had been much interested in learning that various citizens wished to know how he intended to vote in the general election. As far as he was concerned, there had never been but one way in which he could vote with the issue before the country, and that was for union government. He had come one hundred and seventy miles to cast his ballot, but he was overjoyed with the result, not only in York-Sunbury, but elsewhere in Canada.
