Make the Children's Clothes Yourself, and Watch Out for Waste in the Kitchen.

FRENCH TROOPS MAKING STEADY PROGRESS

(From a staff correspondent of the Associated Press.)

With the French Armies on French Front, Thursday, March 29, via Paris, March 30.—The progress of the French advance in the vicinity of Coucy le Chateau, now firmly in French hands, continued methodically today. Both cavalry and infantry are continuing in close touch with the Germans and forcing them to hasten the speed of their retreat. From the strength and thorough preparation of the German defensive works, it was evident that a longer stand was intended.

The castle of Coucy le Chateau, a unique historical monument which ten days ago, although dismantled, was intact as constructed by Enguerrand III in the 13th century, was found by the correspondent when he visited it today to be a mere heap of stones. The correspondent passed over the sites of what had once been the flourishing villages of Folembray, Guny, Trosly-Loire, St. Aubin, Blerancourt and Ouis, and over hundreds of acres of sawed-down orchards, while at the Oise-Aisne canal he saw a number of barges burned to the waters' edge.

SITUATION IN SPAIN IS WELL IN HAND

Madrid, via Paris, March 30.—Count Romanones, the premier, at a meeting of the cabinet today, outlined the situation in Spain and announced that all precautionary measures required in the circumstances had been taken in Madrid.

"The Peoples' House" had been closed and all the provincial labor centres adhering to the general strike will also be closed.

At the present time Madrid is quiet and the bulk of public opinion approves the energetic attitude of the government in view of the revolutionary and anti-patriotic character that a general strike would have under the present circumstances.

HUGE RAILWAY SHOPS

Efficiency in Repair Work Sought by Canadian Roads.

The principal car repair plant of the Grand Trunk Railway for the lines west of the St. Clair River at Port Huron for many years, was destroyed by fire during the winter of 1914-1915. Their old plant was of limited capacity and located at what was the old terminus of the line previous to the construction of the tunnel under the St. Clair River. After the fire negotiations were carried on between the town of Port Huron and the railroad, resulting in the acquisition of the property vacated by the Port Huron Thresher Company, which property was very much more advantageously situated, being near the tunnel line.

The plant was first planned to consist of a power house containing 6 150 h.p. boilers serving double turbo-steam generating units of 300 k.w. for developing the electric power for lighting and operation of machines, all motor driven; a passenger car shop accommodating 27 modern passenger cars; a freight car shop accommodating 70 freight cars; and other buildings. These buildings, including trackage, were to take a space of approximately 55 acres; arranged for economical operation, special attention having been given to this feature to ensure maximum efficiency. The total cost was estimated at \$700,000.

Avoid a Possible Fire

In banking up houses for the winter, do not use leaves, straw or other inflammable material, unless entirely covered with earth; a chimney spark, a carelessly thrown match or a cigarette or cigar stub may ignite it.

The earlier the oat seed is sown the better the crop. This does not mean mudding it in, however.

CUBAN REBELS HAVE LAID DOWN ARMS

Havana, March 30.—Virtually all the soldiers and civilians comprising the rebels of S. Righerto Fernandez, in the province of Oriente, between 500 and 600 in number, surrendered to Colonel Varona at Guantanamo early today.

In surrendering the rebels gave up 30,000 rounds of rifle ammunition and 20,000 rounds of machine gun ammunition, together with 16 dynamite bombs.

Fernandez himself is still at large.
