**SAYS MAKE KAISER****PICK STRAWBERRIES**

Capture and Condemn Him to This Task for Life, Says British Woman Lecturer.

(Philadelphia Bulletin.)

Addressing the suffragists of Radnor township at Wayne last night, Miss Elsie Mackenzie, of London, declared that if the women of England had their way the Kaiser would be captured and condemned to pick strawberries for the rest of his life.

Miss Mackenzie has been a nurse at the front in France and was one of the organizers of the Land Service Corps. This organization of 250,000 women, many of them university girls or the members of aristocratic families, has been working in the fields of the British Isles ever since conscription stripped the farms of their owners and helpers.

"In the spring we pick strawberries," said Miss Mackenzie. "We pick from sunrise to sunset. First your hands are wrecked, then your back, and finally your knees. But you keep picking just the same."

"As the season goes on the women cultivate potatoes, make hay and in fact do all the farm work. But strawberry and gooseberry picking is the worst. I only wish a certain gentleman could be captured, brought to the fen district and put to picking berries, row after row, for ever and ever."

Miss Mackenzie said that when England entered the war the government was opposed to the employment of women in any way, although women had made good in the hospitals and in running remount camps during the South African campaign. As the war grew and the country was stripped of men, the government turned to the women for help.

Today half a million women are doing work in the War Office. There is a women's police force in all the large

cities, they are acting as firemen, substituting for the milkmen, are letter carriers and motor drivers.

Miss Mackenzie, who is the daughter of a former member of parliament, told of her experience as an ambulance driver on the trench front, and said the American hospital outside of Paris was not only the largest, but the best in Europe.

**ST. JOHN RAILWAY HAS CHANGED HANDS**

St. John, N. B., March 6.—Shareholders of the St. John Railway Company are today receiving copies of a circular letter announcing that the sale of the company to the New Brunswick Investment Company has been completed and the company received in full for the property, one million three hundred thousand dollars and a credit of the additional sum of one hundred thousand dollars, to cover the agreed payment of ten dollars a share to the shareholders. The bonds of the new company have been placed in the United States and none are to be offered in Canada.

**FOOD SITUATION IN AUSTRIA.**

Plight of the Poor is Extremely Serious—Grave Events Feared.

London, March 6.—The situation among the poorer classes in Austria is extremely serious, according to comments in the Austrian newspapers on the premier's announcement that the government has appropriated millions of kronen for the purchase of food for the destitute. A Rotterdam despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company says that the Austrian press declares that poverty is so great that the gravest events are expected unless immediate help is given.

The City Clerk said that a company in St. John owned the boards and had no local agent.

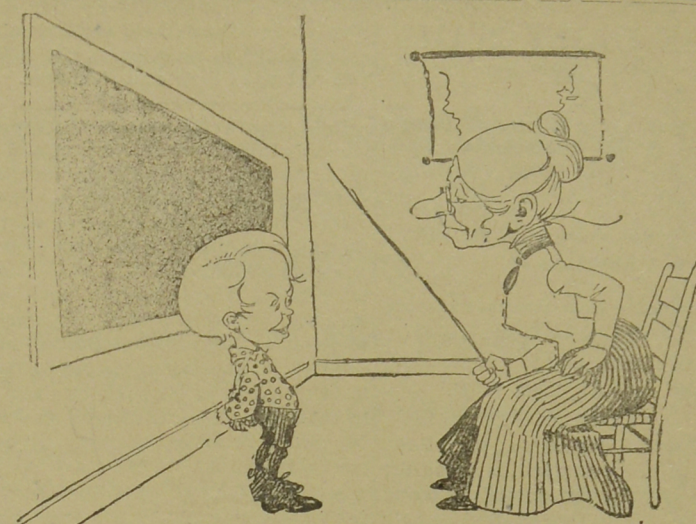
He was instructed to write concerning the matter.

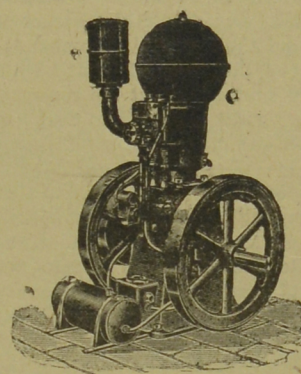
The Council then adjourned.

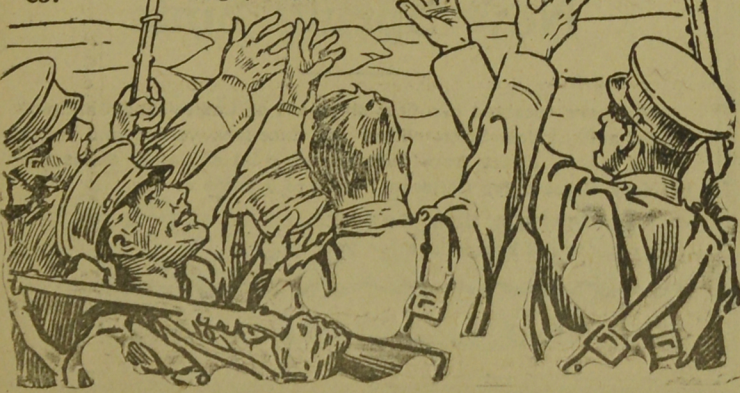

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**AUSTRIA'S REPLY TO AMERICAN NOTE**

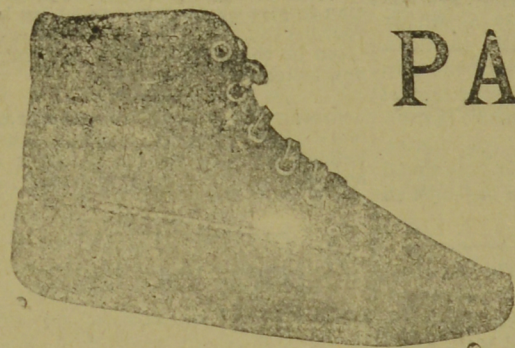
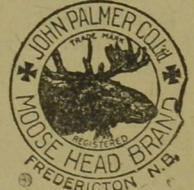
