## LEADERS OF VICTORIOUS PARTY MEET AT ST. JOHN

Men Who Carried the Opposition Standard in the Late Election Met to Consider Plans for the Future---Ringing Speeches by Mr. Foster and Others---Opposition Policy Will be Carried Out.

St. John, March 7.—Because of the failure of some of the Opposition candidates in the recent provincial election to arrive in time, owing to late trains, the meeting of the party leaders last evening was confined to the making of speeches. No business was transacted, the important matters to be considered by the conference being left over until today, when it is expected those who were held up on snow-bound trains will be present. The business meeting will begin at ten o'clock this morning.

About 70 men, including most of the opposition candidates in the last election, and many supporters of the party throughout the province, gathered at 8 o'clock last night in the Opposition headquarters in Charlotte street ready for business, but it was felt that the business session should be postponed until the delayed candidates arrive. All the speakers were delighted with the success of the party at the polls. They paid a fine tribute to W. E. Foster and expressed the hope that he would continue as leader. Mr. Foster was given a rousing reception. E. S. Carter, P. J. Veniot and Messrs. Dugal and Pelletier were praised for their splendid work in exposing the black record of the government.

### Investigation Favored.

The speakers urged that the incoming administration should adhere strictly to the progressive policy adopted while in opposition, and aim to give the people of the province clean, honest government. In this connection the hope was expressed—and there were three ringing cheers as the matter was brought up—that a proper and thorough investigation of the acts of the present government should be made, and any wrongdoing which may have been covered up exposed in the public interest.

Pius Michaud, M. P., of Madawaska, and J. E. Michaud, M. P., elect for Madawaska, resented the false statements made about the Acadian voters by the government press.

"We feel these statements deeply," declared Pius Michaud, "and I assure you, gentlemen, that in the next election our support to Mr. Foster and to our party will be even greater."

J. E. Michaud referred particularly to a boast which he said Hon. B. F. Smith made after the election, that "it was all right, for he could buy over a few Frenchmen and give the government a majority in the House."

"Just let him come and try," Mr. Michaud said, amidst cheers.

### The Opposition Leader.

The meeting was called to order at about 2.30 by W. E. Foster, Opposition leader, who spoke briefly on his own position and that of the party. He expressed his pleasure at the victory achieved, and he felt that if another week had been allowed the victory would have been even greater. Regarding his own position, he said he was a defeated candidate and was entirely in the hands of the party and willing to be of any possible assistance to that party, now or in the future. He said that he had accepted the leadership of the party through a desire to do what he could for the province and not out of any ambitious personal motive. He urged unanimity in the party and the applause which greeted his statement showed how strongly it exists. The party should see to it, Mr. Foster said, that there is formed a progressive and moral administration. He would not care to continue in politics a minute longer had he the conviction that at the expiration of his political career his record would not be just as clear as it is today. Mr. Foster regretted that some of the candidates from Gloucester, Northumberland and Westmorland had been unable to reach the city in time and suggested that the business meeting be postponed until this morning at 10 o'clock.

Upon motion of A. F. Bentley, Senator Gillmor was requested to take the chair. The latter in his remarks spoke of the great pleasure given him by the opposition victory.

### Hon. C. W. Robinson.

Hon. C. W. Robinson, successful candidate in Moncton city, when called upon, said he was proud of the victory. Although before the election he believed the influences at work against the party were almost overwhelming, they had been successfully combatted. He spoke of the splendid service rendered to the party by Mr. Foster in accepting the leadership, and thus adding strength to the tickets in the

different counties, and he urged loyal and hearty support to Mr. Foster and trusted that he would continue as leader.

### E. S. Carter.

E. S. Carter, Opposition organizer, was given a fine reception. He spoke very briefly. He was proud of the victory and was not depressed at his own defeat when he considered the enormous efforts made to defeat him. (Cheers.) He said that now the party would have power to investigate.

Heretofore only a small portion of the real corruptness had been brought to light. The lid had been only partly removed. Now certain affairs of the government which have been concealed from the public should be exposed. Mr. Carter was warm in his appreciation of Mr. Foster. None knew better than he, he said, how his leader had worked. He attributed Mr. Foster's defeat in his own constituency to the fact that he was obliged to give a large part of his attention to the outside province.

### P. J. Hughes.

P. J. Hughes, of Fredericton, paid a tribute to the work of Mr. Carter, Mr. Veniot and the two French members in the Legislature, in exposing some of the government's dishonesty. Messrs. Dugal and Pelletier had been handicapped by a limited knowledge of the English language and they had been tempted by Mr. Flemming to join his party. But, all honor to them, they had resisted that temptation. He hoped and believed Mr. Foster would be the next Premier. (Cheers.) And he believed united support would be given him.

### Dr. Hetherington.

Dr. J. E. Hetherington, one of the victorious candidates in Queens, spoke briefly, but pointedly. He characterized conditions existing in government circles as "rotten," remarking humorously that "a government has gone pretty low when it has to look up to see the bottom." He urged the formation of the strongest executive the material in the party afforded, irrespective of where they came from or anything else, and he agreed with the others in adhering to the principles laid down in the platform.

## FACES SERIOUS CHARGES.

Man in Charge of Livery Stable Given a Preliminary Hearing—Girls Allowed to Go.

The case of two girls belonging to Marysville, arrested on Friday night last in a livery stable in the city on the charge of lying and lurking, was heard behind closed doors in the police court yesterday afternoon. The girls were allowed to go on condition that they stay off the streets and improve their conduct. Two soldiers arrested with them have been handed over to the military authorities.

George Brown, who was in charge of the livery stable, pleaded not guilty to a charge of permitting girls under 18 years of age to loiter about the place, and also to a more serious charge. He elected to be tried before a jury. His preliminary examination before Magistrate Limerick will continue tomorrow.

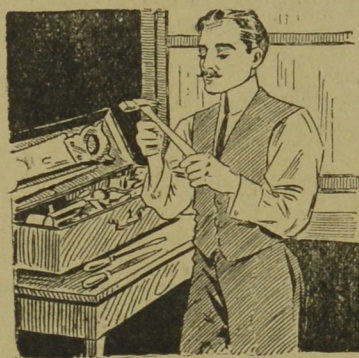
