SERIES MONEY MAY PURCHASE LIBERTY BONDS

Herrmann Will Make Recommendation — Comiskey is Favorable—Red Cross Has Profited.

Cincinnati, O., Oct. 1. — Chairman August Herrmann of the National Baseball Commission announced today that he would recommend to his colleagues at their meeting in Chicago on Friday next that the money received by the National Commission, the interested clubs and the players during the World's Series, except such sums as may be necessary for expenses, be invested by the respective parties in the second issue of Liberty bonds.

Comiskey Favors Bonds.

Chicago, Oct. 1. — When informed of August Herrmann's suggestion that the World's Series money be invested largely in Liberty bonds, Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the Chicago Americans, said "I think it is a splendid idea. Herrmann is to be congratulated for thinking of it, and I'm with him."

Since the opening of the season Mr. Comiskey has given 10 per cent. of the earnings of his club to the Red Cross.

A. B. COXE MAKES GOOD AS BREEDER

When A. B. Cox, who in his college days was a track and football star at Yale, started in as a horse breeder he was called a theorist and the prediction was made that he would not be successful.

Many of the ideas he advanced were held by an older generation of breeders to be impracticable. The Pennsylvania man had shown excellent judgment in buying undeveloped youngsters and was advised by friends to continue to get his colt trotters by that method. His Peter Thompson won the Kentucky Futurity in 1911 and in 1913 Dillon Axworthy carried his colors to the front in the American Horse Breeder purse. He had a few wonderfully well-bred mares and had used as sires Zombro, Del Coronado and Colorado E. His mares threw speed, but not of the extreme flight. He was making the breeding of speed a study and being an exceptionally bright student he learned quickly what his failure to get desired results was due to.

Dillon Axworthy.

Dillon Axworthy's gait and speed suited his ideals when the son of Axworthy was a 2-year-old, and most of the Cox mares, and they now number a considerable, have since been bred to this wonderful young horse.

Peter the Great has been patronized some and the result is that Cox now has on the Grand Circuit in charge of Joe Serrill, Miss Bertha Dillon 2:03½, champion 3-year-old trotter; Nella Dillon, 2:08½, the fastest 2-year-old filly of 1917, and Michaelowa, 2:07½, fastest 4-year-old of the season.

The last named is by Peter the Great, while Bertha and Nella are daughters of Dillon Axworthy, 2:10½. Surely A. B. Cox has achieved success as a breeder and the future should hold even greater things for Dillon Axworthy is only seven years of age and the brood mares at Nawbeek are also young.

THE REAL LADY WON BLUE RIBBON AT LEXINGTON

Miss Bertha Dillon, Heavy Favorite, was Distanced—Five Good Races Held Yesterday.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 2. — The Real Lady, driven by Murphy, won the \$14,000 Kentucky Futurity "the Blue Ribbon" of the trotting turf in convincing style today. Miss Bertha Dillon, world's champion three year old filly, was a heavy favorite in the race, but was distanced in the second heat. In the third heat, The Real Lady reduced her record of 2:04¼ to 2:03¾, which is also the fastest third heat for a three year old filly and within a quarter of a second of the stake record.

The first heat was the closest of the meeting in which the judges' eyes caught the Real Lady first, a nose ahead of Miss Bertha Dillon.
