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GAME WARDEN THREATENED WITH ARREST

Warden Orr of St. Croix Seized Rifles and a Motor Boat From Some American Poachers.

A clash between a game warden of the province of New Brunswick and poachers from the state of Maine which occurred a few days ago bids fair to become an international incident. Warden Orr of St. Croix found a party of four Americans on the New Brunswick side of the line hunting without licenses issued in this province. He seized four repeating rifles which were being used by the men and also the motor boat in which they had come. At night the poachers succeeded in getting their boat away from the warden but the rifles he forwarded to the Crown Land office in this city.

One of the quartette drew a knife on the warden but the latter defended himself with the result that the Maine man was badly beaten.

In City Today.

Warden Orr is in Fredericton today consulting with the provincial authorities concerning the matter. The warden states that he made the seizure at the mouth of a brook a mile and a half within Canadian territory and that he was entirely justified. The Americans on their return across the line swore out a warrant for the warden's arrest on the charge of assault, stating that the trouble occurred in the state of Maine. It is understood that this warrant will be served and the warden arrested if he sets foot on the American side. As he has to leave the train at Vancaboro to reach his home the situation is awkward for him.

HARRY BOOKER OF ROYAL ROAD LOSES AN ARM

Rifle Discharged Accidentally and Shattered Member—Regrettable Accident Last Night.

Harry Booker, aged twenty-two years, son of Mr. Charles Booker of Royal Road, had his right hand and forearm completely shattered by the accidental discharge of a rifle last evening. He was hunting for lost cattle and had his rifle with him. At the residence of Mr. Alex. McFarlane he stopped for a short conversation, resting his rifle on the sill of the barn and keeping his right hand over the muzzle of the weapon. The rifle butt slipped from the sill as the owner talked, the hammer was struck and the rifle discharged. The flesh and bones of the arm were horribly shattered. The young man was rushed to Victoria Hospital and Dr. B. M. Mullin of Devon amputated the arm below the elbow.

Today the condition of the young man is reported to be encouraging.
