## FRENCH CANADIAN M. P.'S SPEAK OUT PLAINLY

**Tell Parliament Why Recruiting Has Lagged in Quebec--Nationalists Propaganda Carried on by Bourassa and His Lieutenants Some of Whom are now Cabinet Ministers--Protestants of Quebec Denied a Portfolio in the Borden Cabinet to Please Nationalist Element.**

Ottawa, Jan 25—Two French Canadian members frankly and earnestly discussed Quebec's position on recruiting and war service in parliament today. Hon. Charles Marcell, in an impressive speech free from any bitterness or prejudice, appealed to "our good friends in Ontario" to be generous in judgment. He asked them to remember that Henri Bourassa's Nationalist campaign against participation in Britain's wars had been carried on by lieutenants who had been elevated to ministerial positions in the Borden administration and that "the wrong crew" had been in charge of recruiting.

He also pointed out that, either negligently or deliberately, every action possible to dampen recruiting enthusiasm and chill inspiration in enlistment had seemingly been determined upon by the government in its direction of military and national service. Mr. Marcell made the charge that, under the insistence of Henri Bourassa and Armand Lavergne or three full-fledged Nationalists in the Borden cabinet, the present Premier had been called upon for the first time since confederation, to deny the Protestant minority in Quebec a portfolio position in the Canadian cabinet. He had consequently to appoint Sir George Perley, who was a rich man, without portfolio, and Sir George was now overseas.

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, who spoke in a similar strain, made the announcement that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had asked his followers everywhere throughout Quebec to conduct an earnest and enthusiastic campaign of education with a view to destroying the no-participation in Britain's wars sentiment which had been promulgated by the Nationalists and that the Liberal leader had urged them to do their utmost to aid recruiting and national service.

Touching the Dorchester by-election, Mr. Lemieux stated that this effort had prompted the Liberals of that constituency to oppose Hon. Mr. Sevigny. He quoted the Orange Sentinel in its approval of the opposition to this Nationalist and its declaration that "it is time for a shaw-down with the Nationalists."

### MacLean Demands Coalition.

The speech of W. F. MacLean—a direct appeal to Premier Borden for the formation of a national government—drew from Hon. Mr. Lemieux the further significant statement that it was the purpose of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, when called upon to form an administration, to create "not a Nationalist, but a National government."

J. H. Sinclair, Guysboro, the last speaker of the day, urged the government to reform and take for its motto, "Millions for War, but not a Dollar for Graft." The besetting sins of the government in its war-time administration had been lack of leadership, indecision and consequent inefficiency. It was necessary that Canadians must have immediate improvement in governmental direction of military matters, which, under existing conditions, was but "sprawling incohesion."

Mr. Sinclair aptly described the government's war programme as a "huge outdoor relief for the Conservative party."

### Two Months Recess.

Parliament will be adjourned early in February, probably for two months or more. Sir Robert Borden announced in the Commons today his acceptance of the offer of the opposition for an adjournment to allow the Premier to attend the Imperial Conference, the war credits and part of the necessary supply to be voted before this was done. The Prime Minister attached two minor conditions to his acceptance, one of which was the introduction by the Minister of Finance of a borrowing bill along the lines of that of last year and the other the taking up again of the work of consolidating the railway act which has been pressed on the government. Both conditions were acquiesced

ed to by Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

In announcing his decision today, Sir Robert asked that supply be voted to June 30, or to the extent of 25 per cent.; that the entire war credit be passed; that the Minister of Finance be allowed to introduce a non-contentious borrowing bill; and that there be no other legislation except the taking up once more of the consolidation of the Railway Act.

The Premier said he had received a demand from all parts of the country for such action. He proposed to have it introduced, get second reading and be sent once more to the joint committee of Senate and Commons which had dealt with it some years ago, which would work on it during adjournment. Sir Robert then informed the House that he had received a cablegram in which the urgency of early attendance at the Imperial Conference on the part of the overseas premiers was set forth.

Sir Wilfrid expressed his concurrence. The consolidation of the Railway Act, he said, might ordinarily open the door to many suggestions, but in these war times he considered it could be kept down to what it was, a consolidation and revision. As for voting supply until June 30th, that was more than usual, but as this was war time he would consent.

Sir Thomas White explained that his borrowing bill was similar to that introduced last session, which covered \$75,000,000, and would deal with borrowing for the general purposes of the Dominion.

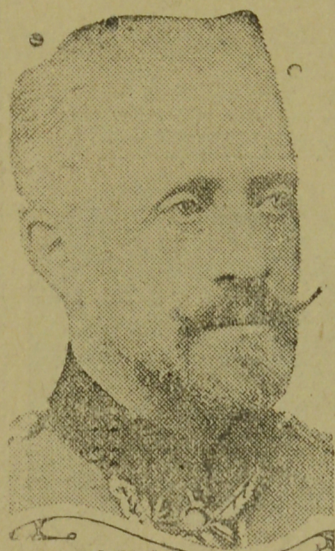
## BOARD OF HEALTH IN SESSION YESTERDAY

General Health Conditions Good--  
Cattle Regulations to be Enforced.

The Fredericton Board of Health met last night and dealt with a number of matters. Mr. William McKay, the health inspector, reported that the general health of the city was good. In all cases of contagious diseases which had been quarantined prior to January, quarantine had been lifted. Two new cases of diphtheria had been taken to Victoria Hospital and the houses fumigated. One case of typhoid, two of scarlet fever and six of measles had been reported during January.

The inspector reported also that he had inspected the school buildings and found them in excellent condition. He had recommended that school rooms be scrubbed twice each month in the winter, and once each month at other seasons.

The inspector was instructed to rigidly enforce the regulation forbidding the keeping of more than two head of cattle in any one stable. Dealers in beef cattle have been violating this.

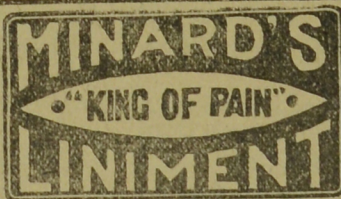
