Mr. Tilley did not think that a rider requiring 15 days' residence in the province should be put in the bill. Not infrequently young couples became acquainted and were married within fifteen days. He did not think it was progressive legislation to impose restrictions of this kind.

Mr. Potts was glad some suggestions he had made when the bill was last be fore the committee had been heeded. He thought young people were capable of thinking right before reaching the age of 18 and did not think this limitation was necessary. Many men of his acquaintance had earned their own livelihood before reaching the age of 14 and some of them had afterwards been honored with seats in the Legis ature. 
