BOARD OF HEALTH WILL ATTEMPT GARBAGE REMOVAL

Special Joint Committee Reports to City Council to Effect That Board of Health Handle the Problem for One Year-- Giving Contract to One Person Said to be Most Systematic Method.

The Board of Health is to handle the garbage removal problem for one year according to the decision of the special committee of the Board of Health and the City Council. At the end of the year it is expected that additional knowledge of the matter will have been obtained.

The report of the committee was presented to the City Council last night by Ald. Wilkinson. It was as follows: Frederickton, N. B. June 1, 1917

To the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Frederickton:

Gentlemen— At a meeting of the Board of Health and City Council held for the purpose of going into the question of the removal of garbage, a committee was appointed consisting of two members of the Board of Health and two members of the City Council. This committee now beg leave to report that they have gone into the matter of the best way of collecting garbage in the City of Frederickton and while they think that the most systematic way would be to have one person given the exclusive right to collect under the supervision of the Board of Health, they think that

this would require legislation to be passed in order to make a contract with anyone for a term of years, and they would therefore recommend that the matter of collecting the garbage be left with the Board of Health to work out for this year, and they then can judge from the result.

Your committee would further recommend that the secretary of the Board of Health make inquiries as to they way the garbage is handled in other cities of similar size in the United States and Canada.

Ald. McLellan congratulated the committee upon its work and upon the fact that the Board of Health for one year is to handle the problem. He thought it ridiculous to believe that the city of Frederickton could not make a contract for a longer period than one year. Twenty-one year leases were made without question. They were nothing else than contracts.

The report was adopted on motion.

MARRIAGE LAW DISCUSSED BY MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE

Some Radical Charges Proposed by Hon. Mr. Robinson--Some Safeguards to be Provided Against Clandestine Marriages--Fifteen Days Residence Required by One of the Parties.

The bill to consolidate the act relating to marriage was before the Legislature yesterday and provided on interesting discussion.

Hon. Mr. Robinson submitted for the consideration of the committee some amendments one of which requires that one of the parties to a marriage contract must be a resident of the province for fifteen days before a license to marry can issue. He said that the amendments were quite radical and had been taken from the Ontario Act.

The Marriage Law.

Hon. Mr. Robinson said that the proposed amendments were borrowed from the Ontario Act and were undoubtedly quite radical.

Mr. Baxter thought that there might be hardship imposed on immigrants arriving in St. John who might wish to get married.

Hon. Mr. Robinson replied that a section of the bill authorized the issuance of a license to meet extraordinary cases.

Mr. Tilley did not think that a rider requiring 15 days' residence in the province should be put in the bill. Not infrequently young couples became acquainted and were married within fifteen days. He did not think it was progressive legislation to impose restrictions of this kind.

Mr. Potts was glad some suggestions he had made when the bill was last before the committee had been heeded. He thought young people were capable of thinking right before reaching the age of 18 and did not think this limitation was necessary. Many men of his acquaintance had earned their own livelihood before reaching the age of 14 and some of them had afterwards been honored with seats in the Legislature. In his opinion the marriage laws of the province were all wrong and the Legislature was only making them worse.

Hon. Mr. Robinson did not know how far the hon. member from St. John was willing to go unless he wanted the whole law repealed. He (Robinson) did not wish to do anything to interfere with the sanctity of marriage, but some safeguards are necessary. He said that the age limit was now 14 but a person marrying at that age must have the parents' consent.

Hon. Mr. Byrne felt sure that all were interested in preserving the sanctity of the marriage bond. The proposed changes were radical but their object was to provide ample safeguards. He favored the clause provid-

ing for 15 days' notice as he felt that marriage should have the greatest publicity as it had a tendency to keep sacred matrimonial ties. He had been informed that some people in order to get married clandestinely and evade the laws of the United States frequently came to St. Stephen to be married. Perhaps the sections of the bill over which hon. members differed might be referred to a law committee. He was glad to have the opinion of the ex-attorney general that there should be legitimization by subsequent marriage. There was no reason why a child born out of wedlock, when the parents subsequently married should be deprived of his or her rights.

Mr. McGrath suggested that the Law Committee employ a learned theologian to deal with the question.

Mr. Tilley thought the points raised should be decided by the committee without the aid of the law committee. The clause requiring 15 days' residence would cause hardship in the case of a person coming from the west to meet his intended arriving by steamer.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale thought the committee should take into consideration the wastage being caused by the war. The whole tendency of the times was to facilitate and encourage marriage.

Mr. Smith (Charlotte) said that he had heard no complaints of people coming into Charlotte to get married and evade the laws. The only effect the section would have would be to divert fees from poorly paid clergymen in New Brunswick to poorly paid clergymen in Maine.

Hon. Mr. Foster said he was responsible for the clause of the bill requiring fifteen days' residence in the province. He had received many complaints from Charlotte in regard to clandestine marriages and the clause was based upon those complaints. Personally he had no objection to the clause being struck out.

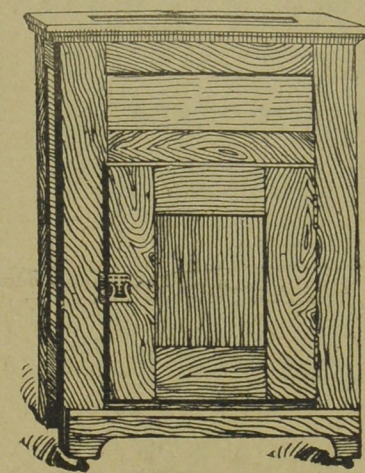
Hon. Mr. Robinson said it did seem that the proposed amendment might create hardship and he was glad that there had been a frank expression of opinion in regard to it. He felt sure the law committee would give the matter careful consideration.
