

FORCING WINTER BULBS

If you have ever grown bulbs indoors so that you had blooms just as the cold long days seemed to cut off every bit of fresh green growth without you do not need to be urged to appreciate how delightful such a show of color is at that time. Many persons you know, do not attempt to have bulbs blooming indoors until about Easter time but, since the great outdoor world will soon be abloom then, it is much more worth while to go in for winter flowering indoor bulbs.

Those who are experts in the matter of winter bulb raising say the best plan is to plant the bulbs in pots about doors at about this time and to allow them to remain there till winter sets in.

The richer the soil, the better, save that they should never be set in fresh manure, which rots bulbs of all sorts. After they are planted in pots they should be set in the ground and then well covered with fine ashes or fallen leaves to prevent them from becoming frost-nipped and as soon as really frosty weather comes they should be brought indoors and kept in a cool place at a temperature of about 50 degrees.

They should be watered from time to time and left in the cool place for three or four weeks and then brought first into a moderately warm place and then into the sunshine.

In keeping them in the cool for considerable time you give the bulbs time enough to develop strong, full blossom buds before they are forced into bloom. If you cannot plant the bulbs first out-of-doors be sure that you keep them first in a cool, fairly dark place for several weeks. Otherwise they are inclined to send up shoots at once before they have developed strong buds within.

In selecting your bulbs for indoor culture be sure to get those that are said to be best suited for indoor culture. Certain varieties are especially adapted for outdoor culture and these should not be forced indoors.

Of all bulbs certain varieties of poet's narcissus are sure of success.

THE WEEKLY
SUMMARY OF
SHIPPING

(Canadian Press direct wire.)

London, Nov. 1.—The weekly summary of shipping, according to the Admiralty report issued last night, follows:

Arrivals, 2,285; sailings, 2,321.
British merchantmen over 1,600 tons sunk by mine or submarine, including one previously, fourteen.
British merchantmen under 1,600 tons sunk, four.
Fishing craft sunk, none. British merchantmen unsuccessfully attacked, one.

French Ships Lost.

Paris, Nov. 1.—French merchant shipping sunk by submarines or mines during the week ending Oct. 28 was two ships of more than 1,600 tons, and one vessel of less than 1,600 tons. No fishing craft were sunk. Four steamships were attacked unsuccessfully.

OBEY THE LAW!

Report at once for Service
or Claim Exemption

Under the Military Service Act, all men in Class One are soldiers today, absent with leave and without pay. Failure to obey the law amounts to DESERTION and can be punished as such.

Class One includes bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

DO IT TODAY!

The rush in the last few days may be such that in the hurry and stress a number of men may fail to comply with the requirements under the Act. That will not be recognized as an excuse, as every man is being given ample time to report for service, or claim exemption.

GO TO YOUR POST OFFICE TODAY and ask for a form for reporting for service or for claiming exemption. Understand, it is a matter of LAW that all the men in Class One must report for service or claim exemption not later than November 10th, 1917.
