ANGLO-AMERICAN RELATIONS DISCUSSED BY DR. J. L. TYRON

Representative Gathering of Citizens Listened to Illuminating Address at the Board of Trade Rooms Last Evening

British-American Friendship, always a congenial topic between residents on either side of the U. S.-Canadian boundary line, was dilated upon last evening at the Board of Trade rooms here before a gathering of educationists, city merchants and a number of Daughters of the Empire, by Dr. James L. Tryon who, as a lecturer on international relations, makes his headquarters at Portland, Ore. Dr. Tryon's address lasted about an hour and as a review of the friendly relations during the past one hundred years of peace between Great Britain and the American republic, and a manifesto of the factors tending to stronger bonds of union between the two peoples by the great world war it was a decidedly interesting discourse.

The learned doctor dealt with the subject in an illuminating way, making liberal and very appropriate quotations from the poets to give additional point to his views, with no attempt at oratory.

He referred to the suggestion of Mr. Page, American ambassador to London, that a new history book be written for the British schools which would better set forth United States sentiments toward the people of Britain; and a new book of history for the United States schools setting forth the true feeling of the British for that country, also that lecturers be appointed from each of the countries to visit and speak, and the encouragement of international visiting of distinguished men of both countries. The war now going on is a struggle of autocracy against democracy. The people of the United States had not grasped the situation as readily as the British, but they had now realized it and were in the war to finish, and this would be another tie cementing the friendship between them.

Dr. Tryon referred to the many causes which had promoted a better feeling between the two countries. He dealt with some of the episodes in the past one hundred years, such as the Alabama case and the Trent affair, which had nearly caused war, until today the

thought of war between the two peoples was abhorrent to all classes of both nations.

Dr. Tryon had not the benefit of a series of screen pictures to illustrate his subject—something that he uses to advantage in this same course, in which portraits of leading men in British-American history are exhibited. With such a prolific theme, however, the audience were well entertained and at the conclusion of the address, Chancellor Jones, who presided at the meeting presented the lecturer on behalf of his hearers with a hearty vote of thanks.

Dr. Tryon, who is accompanied by his daughter, will visit Ottawa and Quebec and return by way of the White Mountains to his home in Portland.

All members of the crew, with the exception of the skipper, are said to be Spaniards. According to reports, the vessel was suspected of supplying oil to German submarines while en route from a south European port to this port.

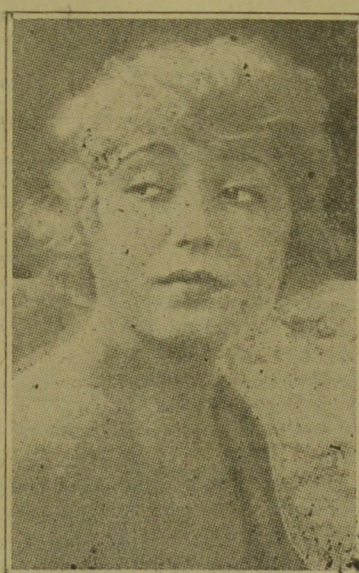
