**CUBS PAY \$2,500**  
**FOR BABE ADAMS**

St. Joseph, Mo., July 11. — "Babe"  
Adams, premier pitcher, and Kenzie  
Kirkham, one of the leading sluggers  
of the Western league, and invaluable  
members of the Drummer team, are  
the latest to be sold in the attempt by  
the management to bring more money  
into the coffers.

Babe is to stage a real comeback,  
and the hero of a world's series is to  
go to Chicago. The Cubs are said to  
have paid \$2,500 in cash and given two  
players in exchange for the Drummer  
manager, whose sale is not to take ef-  
fect for at least 30 days.

Kirkham is to be the property of the  
St. Louis National League team, but  
is to finish the season with the Little  
Rock team of the Southern league,  
provided that team is able to pay the  
salary which Kirkham demands. Kirk-  
ham said that he had received a wire  
telling of his sale and disposition of his  
services and had promptly wired his  
terms to the Little Rock manage-  
ment.

The Little Rock team is one of the  
strongest in the Southern league, a  
Class A organization, ranking with the  
Western league. The sale was made  
on the agreement that Kirkham was to  
report to the Cardinals at the close of  
the season.

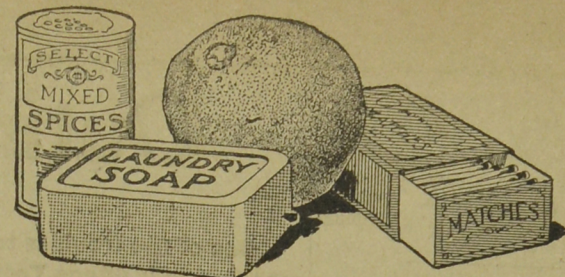
Adams came here at the beginning

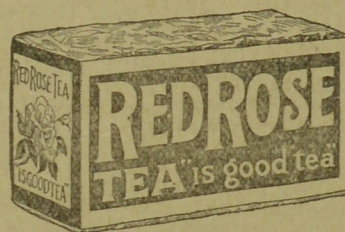
