Sporting News

ROBSON DRAWS WITH F. DYER IN 12 ROUNDS

Dyer Sang a Popular Song After Bout at Boston—Had Maiden Man at His Mercy.

Boston, Sept. 29. — Fred Dyer, the Australian, and Tommy Robson of Malden fought a hard 12-round draw at the Commercial A. C. last night. Dyer made a good impression. He is fast and clever. He jabbed Robson in the wind and face many times and hooked his left to the jaw a number of times, to which he occasionally crossed his right.

Robson went after Dyer at the start but the Australian's clever dodging and blocking prevented him from getting over a knockout punch.

Dyer, who has been making it a practice to sing before and after his bouts, responded to the appeal of the fans to sing one of his favorite numbers. It took him some minutes to regain his wind after the bout. Then, stepping to the centre of the ring, he sang in a clever manner.

Not since the days of old Stonewall Allen has a boxer provided such a stunt in the ring.

YACHT AMERICA TO BE PRESERVED

The famous schooner yacht America, which brought to the United States the Royal Yacht Club trophy, later christened the America Cup, was last week sold to a syndicate of Eastern Yacht Club members, who will preserve it as a relic.

The America was built in 1851 and that summer it won the famous cup. In August of the same year it was sold to Lord John de Blaquiere. Lord Templeton of England bought her in 1854 and laid her up until 1859 when H. E. Decies bought her and named her the Camilla. The yacht was next heard of as a blockade runner and in April, 1862, she was found sunk in the St. John's River by the United States gunboat Ottawa. Later the government used her as a training ship at Annapolis and on August 25 1873, General Benjamin F. Butler bid her in at auction for \$5,000. Since then the boat has been owned by the Butler family.

SHANNON WON BY K. O. ROUTE

Lawrence, Sept. 27. — Eddie Shannon of California, knocked out Larry S. Burns of East Boston in the fifth round at the Unity A. C. here tonight. Shannon led from the start and handed severe punishment to Burns. The latter hit low several times in the fourth round but Shannon's claim of foul was not allowed.

BRENNAN PUTS K.O. ON CLIFFORD

New York, Sept. 27. — The pugilistic status of Jack Clifford, the Brooklyn strong boy, was definitely settled at the Clermont Sporting Club tonight, when he was stopped in the fourth round by "Knockout" Bill Brennan, of Chicago. Brennan, who scaled 199 pounds to 177 for Clifford, outboxed his man from the start.

BEN LEONARD WON ANOTHER

Buffalo, Sept. 28. — Benny Leonard, after being staggered with a straight left in the first minute of the second round, tore into Eddie Dorsey, colored, and with a fusillade of right and left hand punches knocked Dorsey out cold in 2m. 20s. of the second round here tonight.

N. H. A. PROBABLY WILL OPERATE DURING WINTER

Ottawa Not Represented at the Meeting—Other Clubs Decided to Go Ahead—Another Meeting.

Montreal, Sept. 30. — Ottawa was not represented at the meeting of the directors of the National Hockey Association in this city on Saturday, so definite action as to the N. H. A. operating this winter was postponed, although the representatives of Toronto, Quebec, Canadiens and Wanderers decided in favor of doing so.

The next meeting will be held on October 20, when officers will be elected and arrangements for the coming season forwarded to some extent. President Frank Robinson definitely announced his retirement from active service in the association. The majority of the directors seem determined to force a new manager on the Toronto club. A co-operative scheme for the clubs to share profits and losses during the remainder of the war is proposed.

INDIANAPOLIS WON THE SERIES

Indianapolis, Sept. 30. — Indianapolis, champions of the American Association, by its 5 to 4 victory today over Toronto, International League champions, won the post-season inter-league series. The victory gave Indianapolis four of the five games played here and in Toronto.

Captain Bronkie, of the Indianapolis team, who was absent from the series with an injured leg, won today's game by a single in the eighth inning, which scored two runs. Bronkie batted as a pinch hitter for Falkenberg.

Indianapolis' victory was the first game of a scheduled double-header, but it ended the series, which was to continue until one team had won four games. The second part of the double bill was played as an exhibition game. It ended in the sixth inning with the score tied, 4 to 4.

Adams, Sept. 27. — Joe Rivers of Adams was given the decision over Andy Cortez of New York by a close margin in 12 fast rounds before the North Berkshire A. C. club here tonight. Both boys showed plenty of action.
