CONSERVING POTS AND PANS.

Under Rough Treatment an Expensive
Utensil Wears Out as Quickly
as a Cheap One.

Whether or not it is worth while
for you to buy really good kitchen
utensils depends very much on how
you use them. If you are careless and
thoughtless in the way you use them
then the best thing you can do is to
go no further than the 5-and-10 cent
store for them. Buying cheaply you
feel little compunction at having to
buy frequently. It is only for the
housewife who shows real intelligence
in the use of her kitchenware that it
is worth while to get expensive ob-
jects. Then there is the greatest econ-
omy in buying the very best.

Few housewives realize how many
dishes are scraped to death by sharp
knives. Porcelain and enamel ware
especially yield to the sharp edge of a
knife when it is used to scrape them.
Nothing stronger than a brush or me-
tallid dish cloth ought ever to be used
on the bottom of a good stewpan.

Often if dishes are soaked properly
they will need no scouring whatever.
Every cooking dish should be soaked
as soon as you are through using it.
A frying pan or other dish in which
grease has been used had best be wiped
out with a wad of newspaper and
then soaked in hot water. Later it is
well to add a few grains of washing
powder and rub with a brush.

Any dish that has contained milk,
egg or flour mixture should be soaked
as soon as emptied with cold water.
Be sure to fill the dishes full of water
when soaking them, as otherwise there

will be a top ring around the dish that
will be hard to clean.

Always when a utensil has been
rinsed, wash it in a dishpan of hot and
soapy water, making sure to clean the
outside as well as the inside. If you
begin by washing the outside carefully
you will have little trouble in going on
that way. But if you have neglected
the outside of a utensil you may have
trouble ever keeping its outside in
good condition thereafter.

All pots and pans save those of alu-
minum, are the better for a periodic
boiling with washing soda solution.

Fill a boiler with hot water and add
several tablespoonfuls of the washing
soda and then put the utensils into

this and let the boil for 20 minutes.
Rinse thoroughly with clear water be-
fore using again.

FRENCH TOAST.

Beat up together 1 egg, 1 cup of
skimmed or whole milk and salt to
taste. Put a small quantity of butter
bacon fat or other suitable fat in a
broad-bottom frying pan. Dip slices of
stale bread into the egg and milk mix-
ture until they are quite moist. Then
fry in the pan, turning with a fork
until both sides are done a golden
brown. Make a few pieces at a time,
as you do with pancakes. Serve hot
with maple syrup, jelly or just plain
butter.

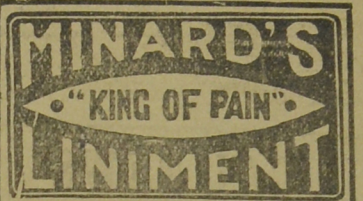
