PENALTY FOR
U. N. B. STUDENTS
ANNOUNCED

A \$25 Fine for Each Taking Part, Suspension Until Payment of Fine, and Loss of Scholarships.

Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the University of New Brunswick, this morning announced the decision of the Board of Discipline with regard to the violation of rules last week by initiation of new students at night. The punishment imposed on each student who took part in the initiation proceedings, is a fine of twenty-five dollars, suspension from all university privileges until the fine is paid, debarment from all prizes and scholarships during the academic year and cancellation of scholarships already awarded.

The punishment went into effect this morning, each student being informed by letter of its terms. All the male students of the Senior, Junior and Sophomore classes except two or three are affected.

Students' Statement.

The students who are affected state that the present student body gave no pledge to abstain from initiation and refuses to be bound by the pledge given two years ago by the members of the class which was graduated in 1917. They state further that the matter will be referred to the university senate.

The Chancellor's Letter.

The letter issued by Chancellor Jones to all students affected is as follows:

Fredericton, Oct. 1, 1917.

Dear Mr. _____

In view of your presence at the initiation of the new men on Thursday evening in spite of the fact that such initiation had been specifically forbidden by the University authorities,

CAPT. VAN WART
ARRIVES HOME
ON SICK LEAVE

Side Injured in Balloon Accident—Had Several Important Staff Appointments.

Staff Capt. Horace H. VanWart, C. E. F., arrived at his home in this city this morning after being before a medical board at Halifax. He has been given several months' sick leave to recuperate from a general breakdown and a badly strained side, the result of an accident in England when Capt. VanWart was in a stationary balloon. Capt. VanWart is a son of Mrs. W. E. VanWart of this city, and is a Brunswick. At the outbreak of the war he was a graduate of the University of New Brunswick and was signalling officer of the 71st York Regt., and went to England with the 12th Battalion of the First Contingent.

In Bad Condition.

As the result of a physical breakdown in England Capt. VanWart was given a choice of coming home to recover or of remaining in the Old Country. After being in hospital in Ireland for some time he decided to come home and crossed the Atlantic by hospital ship in bed. He was accompanied as far as Fredericton Junction by a nurse. His condition is not good but will improve with rest.

Since being away Capt. VanWart held several important staff appointments at Tidworth, Shorncliffe and Dunstable and was sent to France on several occasions.

Death in Devon.

Mrs. Harriet Sophie Perley, widow of Thomas H. Perley, died yesterday at her home in Devon at the advanced age of ninety-two years. Mr. H. Dever of this city, is a brother of the deceased. The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. Tuesday with service at Christ's Church, Marysville.
