DUCHESS OF CONNAUGHT SUCCUMBS TO ILLNESS

Wife of Former Governor General Passed Away in England Yesterday---Left Canada in October Last After Five Years Residence at Rideau Hall---Was by Birth a German Princess---Sorrow at Canadian Capital Over News of Her Death.

London, March 14.—The death of the Duchess of Connaught is announced. During the last few days the relatives and friends of the Duke and Duchess of Connaught were aware that the case of the Duchess was hopeless. In the latter stages of her illness oxygen was frequently administered.

It is thought that the complication of broncho-pneumonia with measles would probably have been successfully overcome but for the drain on the patient's strength caused by an operation in London in 1913. As late as this afternoon the Duchess was conscious and able to recognize the members of her family, who were gathered at the bedside.

The Duchess of Connaught, for five years mistress of Rideau Hall, Ottawa, during the regime of her husband, the Duke of Connaught, came to Ottawa in the fall of 1911 and departed from the shores of the Dominion at the close of 1916, the royal party passing in midatlantic the incoming vice-regal party.

The Duchess was Princess Louise Margaret Alexandra Victoria Agnes, daughter of Prince Charles Frederic of Prussia, famous in the war of 1870, and was born July 25, 1860. She was married in 1879 to the Duke of Connaught. Her eldest daughter, Margaret Victoria Agusta Charlotte Norah, became the wife of the Duke of Skane, now King Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden. Her son, Prince Arthur Frederick Patrick Albert, is now serving at the front. Canada's beloved Princess Victoria Patricia Helena Elizabeth (Princess

Pat) is the youngest of the family. Ottawa in Mourning.

Ottawa, March 14.—News of the death of H. R. H. the Duchess of Connaught was received in the capital with deep regret. During her residence here she had endeared herself to all classes, and following the outbreak of the war allied herself with every movement to send comforts to the soldiers. Perhaps her most notable effort was in connection with a prisoners of war fund, raised through her efforts by twenty-two women's Canadian Clubs throughout Canada, and through which \$55,000 was secured.

Her Royal Highness was honorary president of the Victorian Order of Nurses, and through her untiring efforts \$220,000 was raised to carry on the work of the order.

All her works in Canada in connection with the many war funds and supplies was of an extremely unobtrusive character, and indeed everything she did was marked by a simplicity that endeared her to all. She was ever ready to lend her patronage or personal influence to any worthy cause, and often at great personal inconvenience attended functions and events if she thought her presence would aid in the work on hand.

The Duchess of Connaught Red Cross Hospital at Cliveden, England, which was built by the Canadian Red Cross Society, was named after Her Royal Highness, and will be a fitting memorial to her efforts and will serve as a link to bind her name to Canada in England.

SOREHEADS MAKING TROUBLE IN MADAWASKA

Edmundston, N. B., March 14.—Today was the date set for the opening of the ballot boxes and the counting of the votes cast on February 24. The returning officer, Sheriff Fournier, opened his court at 10 a.m. The defeated candidates, Charles L. Cyr and J. T. Clair, were not present, and Mr. Clair was not even represented. Max D. Cormier represented Charles L. Cyr and A. Chamberland, a lawyer from Grand Falls, was also present in the interest of the defeated candidates, but represented no one in particular.

E. A. Dugal and J. E. Michaud, victorious candidates, were present; also J. M. Stevens, A. Lawson and Pius Michaud, M.P., to look after their interests. The court room was filled to its capacity with spectators.

The sheriff opened all the ballot boxes and declared the result of all the polls but six. Mr. Cormier took objection to the returns of nearly all the polls on the ground that the officers in charge did not comply with requirements of the election law.

All these officers are friends of Mr. Cormier and were appointed with his consent and knowledge, if not under his direction. His action is now placing them in an awkward position, and they feel that he should be the last to deliver to them certificates of incompetency. The course followed by the defeated candidates and Mr. Cormier shows that they are very poor losers and has created much dissatisfaction among their few followers who want to forget as quickly as possible that they were so badly beaten at the polls.

The returning officer has adjourned his court until Tuesday next, March 20, in order to summon the deputy returning officers who had failed to make a return of the votes cast for each candidate at their polls.

New King's Counsel.

Mr. James Friel, of Dorchester, Mr. James P. Byrne, M.P.P., of Bathurst, Mr. George H. V. Belyea, of St. John, and Mr. R. B. Hanson, of Fredericton, have been appointed King's Counsel by the Murray Government. Messrs. Friel and Hanson will present their commissions before the Supreme Court tomorrow morning. The appointments as K.C. are made on the recommendation of the two Chief Justices of the Supreme Court.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT ADJOURNS TILL NEXT WEEK

Prudential Trust Company to be Consulted---Reported Salary Increases Held Up.

The Provincial Government, which had been meeting here this week, adjourned yesterday. The members left for their homes last night. Another meeting will be held next week. It is understood that business with the Prudential Trust Company is making another meeting necessary.

Several increases in salaries of departmental officials reported to have been made by the Murray government have been held up by the Auditor General, Mr. W. A. Loudoun. The latter claims the right to hold up payment of the salaries on the new scale.

St. John Paper Imposed Upon With Fake Engagement Notice.

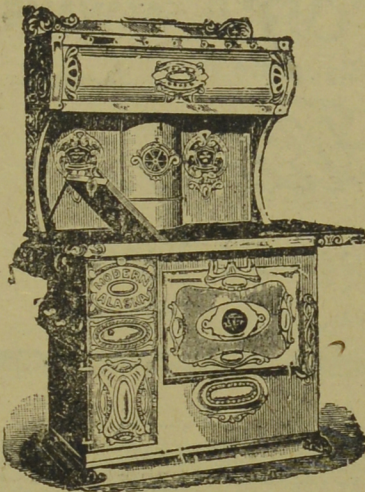

Now Taking Course.

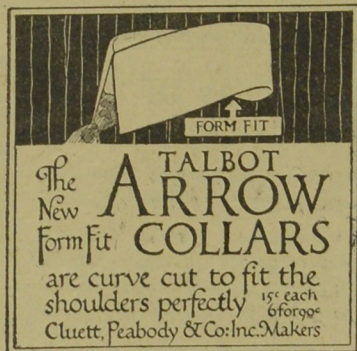
