INCREASE IN DUTY AND VALUE OF IMPORTS

Past Nine Months Showed Increase
In Duty of
\$27,000.

The customs returns for the month
of December show substantial increase
in the value of imports and also in
duty collected. The nine months of
the fiscal year which end with this
month show an increase in duty col-
lected of more than \$27,000, compared
with the same period of the preceding
year.

The returns furnished Collector
Macnutt are as follows:

December, 1916—Free goods, 2,495;
dutiable, \$69,427; total value, \$71,922.
Duty collected, \$11,595.38.

December, 1915—Free goods, \$1,653;
dutiable, \$56,362; total value, \$57,015.
Duty collected, \$9,050.75.

Increase in duty collected in Decem-
ber, 1916, as compared with correspon-
ding month last year, \$2,544.63.

Increase in value of import for De-
cember, 1916, as compared with same
month last year, \$14,907.

Increase in duty collected during the
first nine months of the present fiscal
year, as compared with the correspond-
ing period last year, \$27,091.42.
