THREE GOOD SANDWICHES.

Nut and Honey.

Melt one cup butter, stir in half a cup of honey and ¾ cup chopped walnuts. Chill and spread between biscuits or slices of brown bread.

Novelty Sandwiches.

Spread a slice of thinly cut bread with butter and chopped olives and mayonnaise; then place another slice of bread, buttered on both sides, and spread with pimentos, chopped hard-boiled eggs and mayonnaise; then another slice of bread. This can be varied with sardines, lettuce or chicken.

Tomato and Caviare.

Chop tomatoes, mix with a little mayonnaise, and spread with a layer of this and a layer of caviare. Sardines may be substituted for the expensive caviare if desired, and will give much the same flavor.

FRENCH MUTTON CUELETS.

To one pound of very finely chopped cold mutton add two tablespoonfuls of essence of anchovy, half a teaspoonful of salt, half a teaspoonful of onion juice, ¼ teaspoonful of ground mace, a small pinch of cayenne pepper and 12

raw oysters chopped rather coarse. Mix all together and mold into small balls and fry brown. Serve with tomato sauce.

RICE FRITTERS.

To a cupful and a half of cold cooked rice, add a tablespoonful of sugar, the yolks of two eggs, a cupful of milk and sufficient flour to make a thick drop batter. Add a teaspoonful of baking powder with the last portion of flour, and lastly fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Fry as usual and serve with maple syrup.

THE OLD GARDENER SAYS.

The best flowers for shaded spots in the garden are tuberous rooted begonias, which have immense flowers with velvet like petals in several warm colors. They will bloom from early summer until frost if the bulbs are started in the house now in boxes of pure sand—the sand being kept wet but not moist. Many persons make the mistake of planting the bulbs upside down. Remember that the top is marked by a little dent.

CUBAN INFIELDER MAKING GOOD WITH CLEVELAND TEAM

Louis Guisto the Heaviest First Baseman in Big Leagues—Said to Be Fast on His Feet.

Detroit, April 12.—Louis Guisto, the Cuban ball player, who has taken Gandil's place on the Cleveland team, made a fine impression in his first game at Detroit. His corking hit in the initial innings scored two runs, and paved the way to victory.

Guisto is probably the heaviest infielder in the major leagues today. He weighs more than 200 lbs. and is not more than 5 feet ten inches tall. Guisto is the heaviest man to play first base in the major league since the days of Captain Anson, Dan Brouthers, Roger Connor and Dave Orr. All these men were not fast fielders, but terrific hitters, not only in distance, but in the high average of number of hits made. Anson led the league in hitting for years, and the other three named were at the top some years and always among the leaders as long as they played ball. Guisto will be obliged to give an excellent account of himself to equal the record of these old-timers, who were short on speed, but long on hitting. Guisto is described as exceptionally fast and quick on his feet, considering his weight.

Guisto was considered the best first baseman on the Pacific coast last year. He played 120 games for Portland, and averaged slightly more than one hit per game. He made 122 hits, including 33 doubles, 2 triples and 14 home runs. His fielding average was high. He made only eleven errors in accepting 1,251 chances.

SUNDAY SAYS WAR WILL NOT PUT STOP TO SPORT

New York, April 14.—Billy Sunday, like Major General Wood, U. S. A., believes in sport during war time. The noted evangelist, in discussing sport and war, declared that he believed the former would be continued. When sport begins to interfere with military plans and preparations, it will be time to curtail it, says Sunday. When they do not interfere, sporting events give the average citizen a relaxation from the seriousness which is the natural result of trouble.

Sunday has received a season pass to all the National League parks from President John K. Tener, a friend of many years. The two were prominent players in the National League back in the '80's.

THORPE ABANDONS FOOTBALL

Boston, April 14.—Jim Thorpe is quoted as saying that he is through with football and he gives as a reason that he might get injured and be compelled to give up baseball.

Jim is out to make good in the national pastime, and believes he has some distance to go playing the game. If the times were different, we might be skeptical about the famous player's ability to keep out of football.

FORMER CAMBRIDGE RUGBY STAR KILLED IN RECENT FIGHTING

Major M. A. Black Met Death While On Flight—Fewer Athletes Fell During Past Few Days.

London, April 15.—In spite of the big advance made on the western front—in which hundreds of famous British sportsmen took part, the latest list issued shows a welcome falling off in the casualties.

Major M. A. Black, who met his death in an air fight, was the well known Cambridge University Rugby footballer, who played half-back for his 'varsity against Oxford in 1897 and 1898, and when he entered the Dragoon Guards won great fame as a polo player and 'cross-country rider. He also served with distinction in the South African war.

C. Vigurs, the international gymnast of the Birmingham Athletic Club, has also made the supreme sacrifice. He was a member of the Birmingham Athletic Institute team which for three years in succession won the Adams Shield international team championship and represented England at the Olympic games at Stockholm in 1912. Lieut. W. C. Bird, one of the sixteen "Kettering Pals" who enlisted together in September, 1914, has fallen.

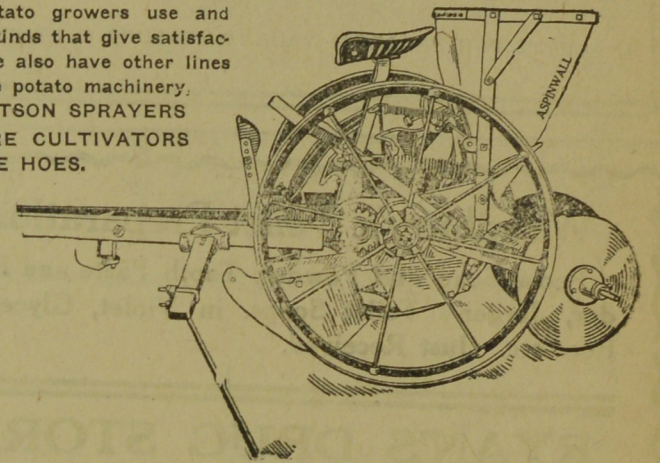

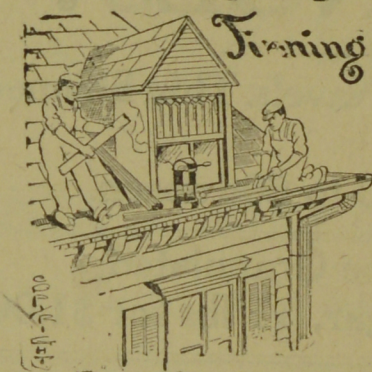
