He joined the 23rd Battery as a gunner and shortly afterward was transferred to the 24th Battery with the rank of corporal. After his arrival in England he joined an ammunition column with which he served for more than a year He then was transferred to a heavy trench mortar battery with which he has since been

It is believed that the trench mortar batteries have taken a prominent part in the assault on Vimy Ridge and other recent engagements.


