KITCHEN ESTATE BEFORE PROBATE COURT FOR FINAL SETTLEMENT

Valued at \$197,000---Recess to Permit Heirs and Executors to Agree on Large Number of Accounts.

Mr. H. G. Fenety, Judge of Probate, pro hac vice, in the matter of the will of the late George Kitchen, of Kingsclear, railway contractor, opened his court at eleven o'clock this morning. All heirs were present or were represented.

At 11.30 an adjournment was made to enable the heirs and executors to confer and reach an agreement concerning a large number of accounts which are not disputed. The court will resume at four o'clock this afternoon.

The state is valued at \$197,000 and has been administered by the executors since the death of the late Mr. Kitchen about five years ago. The executors are Mr. A. B. Kitchen, son of the deceased, and the widow.

Mr. R. B. Hanson, K. C., is representing the executors. Mr. A. J. Gregory, K. C., is representing Mr. Willard Kitchen, of Vancouver, B. C., who is now in this city, and who is one of the heirs. Other heirs are Messrs. A. B. Kitchen, Coles Kitchen and H. G. Kitchen and Mrs. R. G. Lee, of Fredericton.

This will be the final settlement of the estate.

Ice Jammed at Macinac.

The ice in the Nashwaak River ran out yesterday from Marysville to the mouth, leaving the stream practically clear. The ice in the St. John river at this point appears to be weak, but has not moved. The water is still rising. Reports from up the river are that the river is clear of ice at Hawkshaw, but that a large jam has formed at Macinac.

GR. JOHN HARVEY REPORTED WITH GUNSHOT WOUND IN ARM

With Heavy Trench Mortar Battery---Left Canada With 24th Field Battery---Telegram Says Slight Wound in Left Arm

Mrs. John Harvey, of this city, was notified yesterday morning by official telegram from Ottawa that her son, Gunner John Harvey, was reported in the casualty list with gunshot wound in the left arm, slight.

Gunner Harvey was one of a large number of U. N. B. students who enlisted in Fredericton soon after the beginning of the war in the field artillery batteries raised in this city. He joined the 23rd Battery as a gunner, and shortly afterward was transferred to the 24th Battery with the rank of corporal. After his arrival in England he joined an ammunition column with which he served for more than a year. He then was transferred to a heavy trench mortar battery with which he has since been.

It is believed that the trench mortar batteries have taken a prominent part in the assault on Vimy Ridge and other recent engagements.

Late Mrs. Alma Hanson.

Mrs. Alma Hanson, wife of Thomas Hanson, passed away at her home, Victoria Mill, at 6 o'clock Saturday night. She is survived by her husband and one infant child, her mother, Mrs. John P. McDonald, six brothers, George, Jack and Frank, at home, Thomas in Manitoba, Joseph of Moncton, and Edward in France with the 10th Battalion; also one half-brother, Thomas, two half-sisters, Mrs. Morris Shea and Mrs. Feedam, of Halifax. The funeral took place this morning with solemn High Mass at nine o'clock by Rev. Fr. Carney. Interment was made at the Hermitage.

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
