MARITIME UNION DISCUSSED IN THE HOUSE

Important Resolution Proposing Conference With Representatives of the Other Maritime Provinces was Carried Without a Dissenting Voice—The Subject Aably Discussed by Messers Baxter and Magee—Strong Arguments Advanced.

In the Legislature yesterday afternoon a resolution moved by Mr. Baxter and seconded by Mr. Magee, declaring in favor of legislative union of the Maritime Provinces was adopted unanimously. The resolution was as follows:

Maritime Union.

Whereas the growth and development of the western provinces of Canada have been much greater in the past than that of the maritime provinces, and are likely to be still greater after the war; and

Whereas the representation of the maritime provinces in the dominion parliament is not likely to increase and possibly may be decreased if the population of such provinces shall not increase proportionately to that of Canada as a whole; and

Whereas it is becoming more and more important that there shall be unity of aim and action among the representatives of the maritime provinces in the dominion parliament, so that the said provinces may obtain from the development of Canada such advantages in commerce and transportation as will give them a fair share in the benefits accruing from the development of our country; and

Whereas the assembly together of representative men of the maritime provinces in the transaction of public business would tend to promote community of aim, unity of action and a wider understanding of the needs of these communities;

Therefore resolved that this house would favorably regard any action which the government may be disposed to take for the purpose of ascertaining whether the provinces of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island or either of them, would be willing to consider the question of legislative union of the maritime provinces.

Mr. Baxter.

In speaking to the motion Mr. Baxter said that he realized the desire of the house to get through the business as quickly as possible; therefore the remarks that he would make would not be on such an extensive scale as they otherwise might have been. He thought there could be no question that the people of Canada as a whole realized that their political, social, business and other relations would be much closer than they were before the war. They had had a lot of co-operation forced upon them for the sake of the empire, but despite the sacrifices they had been called on to make, good would come out of it; therefore he thought the people of this province should take the opportunity to consider a question that had on previous occasions occupied the attention of the people of the maritime provinces.

He said he need not refer to those previous occasions. All were aware of the outcome of the meeting at Charlottetown in 1864, which had resulted in the birth of this great dominion. At that time the smaller project was lost sight of, but the time had now arrived

when the provinces ought once more to consider their relations to each other. The west was filling up and would fill up more quickly when the war was over, which, in turn, meant increased representation in the dominion parliament. The people in the eastern provinces do not know each other as they should.

Mr. Magee's Speech.

Mr. Magee said he had very much pleasure in seconding the resolution just moved. It was purely non-political. There were many resolutions moved by his hon. friend, which he (Magee) could not see his way to second, but this one he could most heartily. The mover had referred to the conference which took place in 1864 to bring about Maritime union and he need not repeat it. Circumstances, however, had changed in the last few years, whatever reasons there were in the past for each of the provinces to stand alone, he thought were hardly one of the most particular reasons for consolidation was on account of the representation in the dominion parliament. The population in the three provinces was at a standstill, there had been an increase in the last ten years of 40,000 only, whereas the western provinces had increased enormously. That went to show that the people of the Maritime provinces should take concerted action for some aggressive policy to bring in new people. The loss in representation of five members as against a gain of twenty to the western provinces should make the people of the Maritime provinces stop and think. There is no foreign population here and instead of competing with each other and engendering antagonistic feelings under one Government all would unite to make the best in every way. That was the policy that should be adopted.

Technical Education had been referred to and in that subject alone there were tremendous opportunities for co-operation. Three or four years ago he had attended a meeting at Amherst of a large number of the leading men in the three provinces in aid of what was known as the Maritime Forward Movement at which he had spoken a few words, one that he had referred to was the subject of Maritime union. He had no idea how it would take, but he was surprised at the applause which greeted his remark, and gentlemen from each of the provinces, had expressed approval of the project. There appeared to be a feeling among them in favor of Legislative union. At present the three provinces are working independently when they should be collective, all under one management. If united they could better meet the competition which was being forced upon them by the western provinces. There were of course many things to be considered and the proposal would naturally meet with opposition, much of it probably on sentimental grounds, but sentiment would have to give way for general betterment. He trusted the matter would be taken up and discussed and the committee appointed from the three provinces to consider ways and means. Co-operation would enable the three provinces to advertise their advantages. Take the fishing industry for instance, the value of that industry in the Maritime provinces is \$16,000,000, half the value of the whole industry in Canada, but it was only in its infancy. (Perhaps Maritime Union would enable the three provinces to control their own fisheries, and if that was done they might reasonably hope to increase the value of them to double what they are at the present time.

MR. BAXTER'S RESOLUTION BOWLED OUT BY LEGISLATURE

Hon. Mr. Byrne Tells Ex-Attorney General That He Was Not Concerned About the Honor of the House When He Permitted the Flemming Whitewash Resolution to go Through.

In the Legislature yesterday a resolution by Mr. Baxter calling for a reference of the case of Hon. Robert Murray and Mr. Dysart to the committee on privileges was voted down and an amendment by Premier Foster was adopted. Mr. Baxter had charged that the members referred to were holding petty offices at the time they were elected and were therefore disqualified from holding their seats.

The premier's amendment pointed out that Mr. Dysart although appointed a Parish Court Commissioner had never been sworn in and that Hon. Robert Murray had resigned the office of Master of the Court for Northumberland. It further set forth that the matters involved were technical points of law and no good purpose would be served by referring the matter to the committee on privileges.

The premier speaking to the amendment cited the case of Mr. T. J. Carter, of Andover, who when a member of the House had been paid \$100 from the provincial treasury for professional services by the late government. Mr. Dugal had questioned the late government in regard to the matter and one of his questions had been answered as follows:

"Whether the action of Mr. Carter in accepting the payment referred to is or is not a violation of section 14 of the election law, is a question of law for the determination of a court or other body having jurisdiction therein, and is not a matter of fact concerning which the government should make any statement."

Mr. Baxter argued that the honor of the House was affected, and this be-

ing so the committee on privileges should be given an opportunity to perform its functions.

Hon. Mr. Byrne spoke vigorously in support of the amendment. He reminded Mr. Baxter that he was not so keen in maintaining the honor of the House when the Flemming white-wash resolution was before it a few years ago.

Mr. Baxter said he was absent from the House at the time the white-wash resolution was before it, but he had not absented himself for the purpose of shirking the vote.

Hon. Mr. Byrne said that he (Baxter) upon returning to the House had not censured his colleagues for passing the resolution. He understood that the hon. leader of the opposition had voted for the resolution. He (Byrne) felt that nothing was to be gained by referring the resolution to the committee on privileges.

Hon. Mr. Foster's amendment was carried without division.
