being 72 strong.**HOUSE DECIDES AGAINST**  
**WOMAN SUFFRAGE BILL**(Continued from Page 3.)  
Hon. Mr. Veniot said he would ac-  
cept the hon. member's statement, but  
he doubted his sincerity. He (Veniot)  
had cast his first vote against woman  
suffrage in 1898 as he was opposed to  
the principle. The records of history  
showed that the first franchise granted  
to men was limited and it took sixty  
years to get manhood franchise as it  
exists today. While he had in 1898  
been opposed to woman franchise on  
principle he had since changed his  
views to some extent and would be  
willing to give the franchise to un-  
married women. He was opposed,  
however, to dual representation in a  
family. Had the women of the pro-  
vince placed the bill before the House  
in the proper light it might possibly  
have gone through without opposition.  
He did not agree with his hon. friend  
from St. John (Potts) that all the trou-  
bles of the world were traceable to  
man. As proof that the hon. member  
was wrong in his contention it was  
only necessary to refer to the schem-  
ing which had been carried on by the  
wife of the Czar of Russia and the  
wife of the King of Greece in connec-  
tion with the present war. All would  
have to admit that a great many of  
the women of the province did not  
want the franchise. This being so, it  
would be wrong to force upon them  
something which they did not desire.  
He would strongly advise the women  
not to force the measure through the  
House at the present time, but to let  
it stand for a year. In the meantime  
hon. members could test the sentiment  
of their constituents in regard to it.  
He would give a pledge that if the bill  
were withdrawn until next year he  
would take means to ascertain the sen-  
timent of the people of his constitu-  
ency toward it, and if he found they  
were favorable toward it he would  
come to the House next year prepared  
to give such a measure his support.**Wanted Action Deferred.**  
Mr. Mersereau said that his object  
in moving an amendment was that the  
bill might lie on the table until next  
session in order to give hon. members  
a chance to consult their constitu-  
encies with regard to it. He would like  
to make an alteration in the amend-  
ment.Mr. Baxter said the rules of the  
House would not permit a bill to stand  
over until the next session.Hon. Mr. Veniot said that there was  
nothing to hinder the present bill from  
being introduced next session.Mr. Mersereau said he had no desire  
to kill the bill, but simply wanted it  
held over.The ex-Attorney General.  
Mr. Baxter said he should have to  
vote against the amendment. There  
never yet had been a bill introduced in  
the House to amend the franchise that  
had not been brought in by the admin-  
istration. The law committee had  
gone carefully through the bill and had  
found it well nigh unworkable. The  
matter was non-political, but at the  
same time he felt it was desirable that  
any division that was taken should be  
on party lines for the simple reason it  
affects the franchise.It was probable, however, that there  
was considerable difference of opinion  
between the members on the govern-  
ment side of the House themselves,  
but it seemed to him that the govern-  
ment ought to take the responsibility  
for enlarging the franchise.The difficulty in connection with the  
bill having been introduced by a pri-  
vate member was that there was a  
tendency to treat the matter some-  
what lightly. He had been informed  
that the bill had been prepared by a  
very eminent counsel the very men-  
tion of whose name was always greet-  
ed with applause among gentlemen  
opposite, yet in preparing the bill he  
overlooked a good deal of the machin-  
ery necessary to make the bill work-  
able and if the bill should pass in its  
present form both parties would be  
put under great difficulties on account  
of the way of making up the voting  
lists.The largest organ in the world, with

alterations in the sections of the bill  
as were necessary to make it intelli-  
gible that it would need a great deal  
more to make it effective.Mr. LeBlanc said it was only fair  
for members to rise and give their  
reasons for not supporting the bill.  
There had been a lot of criticism di-  
rected against the hon. member for  
Westmorland (Mr. Magee) but he (Le-  
Blanc) agreed with him, that mem-  
bers didn't have to consult their con-  
stituents every time a vote was called.  
There were questions and questions.  
It was one thing to decide whether it  
should be legal to shoot a moose with  
five points to his horns and another  
whether they should give votes to  
women. His hon. friend was perfectly  
correct when he said he had a man-date from his constituents. Women  
had played a noble part in the war  
largely because they were free from  
politics. If they had been in politics  
and allied with the tory party they  
would have done just what the tory  
party did. Much had been said as to  
the percentage of women who wanted  
to vote. He had asked many women  
in his own constituency and had failed  
to find a single one who cared any-  
thing about it. There was no hurry  
to bring the bill on, and if it went  
through he would suggest that they  
make the age limit at which single  
ladies could vote, forty years.The amendment to put the bill over  
till next session was then voted on.  
Twenty-four voted for it and fifteen  
against it. The amendment was there-  
fore carried.
