WAR LID ORDER
WAS OBEYED QUICKLY

Broadway's White Light District in Gloom
As Soon as Clock Strikes One—Clubs
the Only Recourse of the Thirsty.

(New York Sun.)

Mr. Knickerbocker arose this morning, cursed the weather man as usual, had his breakfast and went to what ever he calls work. It was just the same old morning to him. With his visiting cousins from every quarter of the globe, however, it was the most different morning they ever had known in New York—a morning on which they awoke clear-eyed, without a thirst and with the feeling that they had enjoyed a good sleep.

For it was the first time in years that the lights of Broadway failed to shame the dawn. They were out promptly at 1 o'clock and war made its official entrance to the White Light district. It seems that Mayor Mitchell did not mean to close things up until tomorrow morning, but Police Commissioner Woods and the proprietors of the thirst parlors, cafes, cabarets and hotels thought he did and the unheard of happened—a closing order was enforced to the letter without a word of protest from those who suffered most.

Soon after midnight waiters went from table to table in Churchill's, Murray's, Rector's, Reisenweber's, Healy's, the Moulin Rouge, Palais Royal, Tokio and the other lively spots in the city's gayest district and informed patrons that they must be ready to get out by 1.30 o'clock at the latest and that neither drink nor food would be served after 1 o'clock.

There were protests, of course, but they had no effect. By 1 o'clock Broadway and its cross streets from Forty-second street to Columbus Circle were as crowded as on election nights. Taxicabs threaded their way slowly uptown. Trolley cars crawled through the homegoing throng. And then the big electric signs which advertise everything blinked and went out.

Meanwhile squads of uniformed policemen had been sent into the lobster district and told to see that the closing order was enforced. They had little to do except to direct bewildered late comers how to get out of the gloom.

"Jack" Dustan, who voluntarily put a stop on the sale of liquor after 4 a. m. in his Sixth avenue place recently, kept open his kitchen and sold food, but he did not have the old gay crowds which have made his restaurant a twenty-four hour one. In common with other restaurant men he indorses the mayor's order.

Some thirsty gentlemen hurried to the clubs after 1 o'clock and got the action they desired. Others hurried to other clubs and got the shock of their lives to find the bars closed. While the mayor's order does not affect legitimate clubs many boards of trustees have voluntarily decided to

observe the spirit of the proclamation. In others members may purchase drinks for themselves, but may not take guests into the barrooms.

So night life in New York follows night life in Paris, Berlin and London. Gay Paris was the first city to feel the incongruity of war and frivolity. Almost with the coming of war Paris shut its cafes and began to economize. Last winter the government issued an order forbidding the sale of spirits during the war and light wines are drunk only with meals.

London followed Paris after many months. It was November, 1915, before a rule was made restricting the sale of liquor to between noon and 2.30 p. m., and from 6.30 to 9.30 o'clock at night. The supper clubs, which have made London night life famous have passed away one by one. In November, 1915, Berlin also made an order closing all bars and other drinking places at 9 p. m.

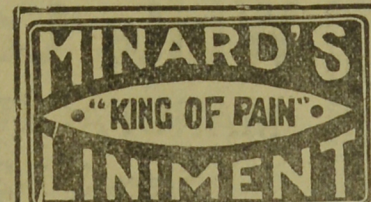
