Its ritual, its creed, its tradition, would be that all are non-essential. Its test would be a life, not a creed ——what a man does, not what he professes; what he is, not what he has. Its object, to promote applied religion, not theoretical religion. Thus would develop its interest in all the great problems of human life—i—ndustrial, social and moral problems. Its first concern would be to encourage Christ living seven days a week and fifty-two weeks a year—a belief that success therin would be the best guaranty of eternal life and a mansion in the skies.
