PETROGRAD
PEOPLE UNEASY

Petrograd, Sept. 7. — Petrograd, al-
though in the opinion of various mili-
tary authorities in no immediate
danger on account of the fall of Riga,
nevertheless is making preparations
against the eventuality of an unex-
pected descent by the Germans. The
temporary government has appointed
a civil commission with authority to
preserve order, suppress seditious
meetings, suspend the publication of
newspapers and where advisable clear
the city of undesirable elements. The
cabinet has decided that there is yet
no need for the government to be
transferred. Although there are no
signs of a panic, there are elements in
the population, particularly members
of the wealthy class who are leaving
or attempting to leave, in large num-
bers.

WANT DOMINION WIDE SUFFRAGE

Vancouver, Sept. 8.—The Women's
New Era League last night sent a mes-
sage to Premier Borden demanding
Dominion wide suffrage for women,
and asking H. H. Stevens, M. P., to
press for woman's suffrage. A copy of
the message was sent to the leader of
the Opposition.

Because so many men have been
drafted from the shops of the Big Four
Railroad at Urbana, Ill., an appeal has
been issued to all pensioned employes
to return to work. Those responding
will draw regular pay but their pen-
sions will cease.

FIRES BEHIND
GERMAN LINES

New York, Sept. 8.—The New York
World publishes a despatch from Lon-
don saying that numerous large con-
flagrations are said to have been seen
recently near the German lines, par-
ticularly in the Lille sector, and it is
believed that these fires indicate that
the Germans may be planning another
winter withdrawal to a new line, as
they did after the Battle of the
Somme.

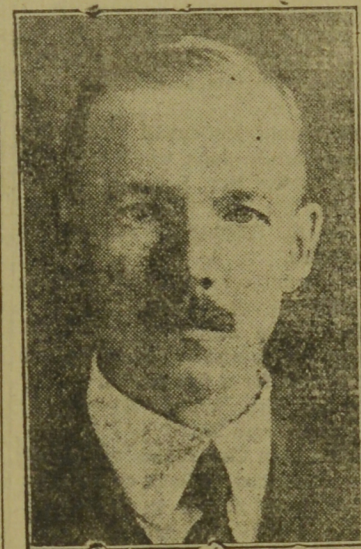
It is also reported that thousands of
the French population in the same
section of German occupied territory
are being sent back within the French
lines, via Switzerland, presumably
to conserve food supplies and reduce
the civilian population to a minimum
in the areas where the heavy fighting
may take place.

London suspects however, that this
shifting of civilians may be but another
indication of the German intention
to retire.

3 ITALIAN SHIPS
LOST IN WEEK

ships were sunk during the week end-
ing Sept. 2, it is officially announced.
"In all seas," says the statement,
"three steamers were sunk and one
small auxiliary signalling vessel was
damaged by a torpedo attack. It was

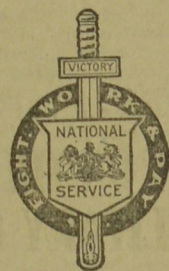
