RESIDENT OF
ISLE OF PINES
RETURNS HERE

Mr. John Simms, Formerly of Fredericton, Left His Business on Account of Race-War.

Mr. John Simms, a native of Fredericton and a resident of this city in his early life, has returned to this city to take up his residence for a time. For a considerable number of years Mr. Simms has been in business in the Isle of Pines where he kept a store. That island lies immediately to the south of Cuba and was Spanish territory up to the time of the American-Spanish war. Recently the elections in the Isle of Pines resulted in such a way that the control of public affairs passed out of the hands of the colored population into the hands of the whites. The change was not to the liking of the blacks and rebellion on a considerable scale broke out. News of the trouble has not been given any great prominence in the press but the race war assumed such proportions that many lives have been lost and business much affected. It is predicted by many that the United States government will have to intervene before order is restored.

Mr. Simms intends to continue his residence in Fredericton until order is restored in the Isle of Pines when he will resume his business there.

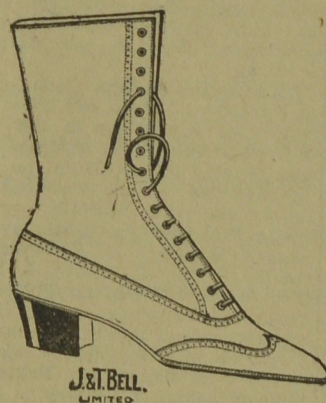
