OFFICIAL STATEMENT SAYS ENEMY ARTILLERY CONTINUES VERY ACTIVE EAST OF YPRES

LONDON, Aug. 9.—To the northwest of Bixschoote the French gained further ground against the Germans during the day, while the British repulsed attempted raids by hostile contingents at several points on their front, according to the official communication issued last night, the text of which follows:

"A heavy rain is again falling. Our Allies gained further ground during the day northwest of Bixschoote. Hostile raiding parties were repulsed last night and this morning north of

The enemy's artillery continued to show great activity east of Ypres. Yesterday, in spite of continuous wind, airplanes bombarded the enemy railway tracks, siding and trains forty miles behind the German lines, causing much damage, derailnig one train and blowing up another. Bombs also were dropped the previous night on an enemy ammunition depot. One of our machines is missing.'

INTERNED BRITISH AND FRENCH PRISONERS EXPOSED TO AERIAL BOMBARDMENT BY HUNS

PARIS, Aug. 9.—The French authorities learn that during the night of July 25, when French airplanes bombarded Treves and Essen, the Germans forced French and English prisoners, both officers and men, interned at Karlsruhe, to leave their quarters and remain in the open, where they most probably would be hit in case Karlsruhe was bombarded. The men were compelled to remain in these places until all danger had passed.

ANOTHER GERMAN RUSE.

PARIS, Aug. 9.—The French War Office announces that the Germans have invented a new ruse to lead their opponents into the belief that artillery batteries are still in position for action when actually they have been withdrawn, and by it to prevent untimely advances. The device consists of a mechanism fitted with half a dozen globular capsules filled with an explosive, which is placed on the site of the battery to be or being withdrawn. The capsules explode every 35 or 40 seconds with a sound exactly like that of a field gun heard from a distance. still facing fire.

DESTROYED AUSTRIAN SUBMARINES.

PARIS, Aug. 9.—During a recent Italian aerial raid on Pola, the Austrian naval base on the Adriatic, two airplanes with bombs destroyed two Austrian submarines which were being repaired there.

SECRET PASSAGE DISCOVERED IN ROME PROBABLY USED BY HUNS

ROME, Aug. 9.—The sensation of the day here is the discovery of a secret subterranean passage from the Villa of the Roses, the residence of Prince Von Beulow, former German ambassador, to the Hotel Eden, the former proprietor of which was a German. It is believed the passage was used to facilitate secret meetings between the diplomat and persons in various walks of life, as well as to ensure scerecy to the ambassador's guests when the occasion required. An investigation which promises interesting disclosures is underway.

SEVERE MEASURES ADOPTED BY KORNILOFF

HAVE SAVED RUSSIAN ARMIES AT THE FRONT

PETROGRAD, Aug. 8.—Korniloff's prompt severity has saved all that was worth saving in the armies at the front. The first corps to set the bad example and lead the general exodus from the fighting lines was the Corps d'Elite of Guards from Petrograd. Their commander, General Maevsky, was among those who received Korniloff's order to fire upon deserters, but he failed to carry out his orders. Korniloff, in strict accordance with ustice, sent Maevsky before the court-martial for disobedience of orders, and he was sentenced to be shot.

Russian history thus has a new precedent, for never before has the commandant of a Guards corps undergone such shame. The oldest Guards regiments, which Kerensky ordered to be disbanded for cowardice, will not be so treated. It is universally recognized that their historic names must live, even although they have passed through mud, like the rest of Russia during the last five months. The regiments will be reformed out of worthy volunteers from the fighting armies.

A fighting general here tells me that the Russian armies will soon be as good as ever under the same commanders, where any of these still survive the experience of the last five months. Considering all things, it is worth noting how little progress the Germans are making in their absolute walkover. The Eighth Army, though still retiring, has none of the enemy

MONTREAL, Aug. 9.-Considerable of a sensation was created through out the city this morning when it became known that an attempt was made last night to blow up the summer residence of Lord Athelstan at Cartierville. Twenty-two windows in the house were shattered by the explosion, the walls were damaged and havoc wrought in the interior of the home.

Lord Athelstan, his wife and daughter were in the house at the time, but all escaped with a shaking up and a scare. The explosion occurred about four o'clock in the morning and could be heard and felt for several miles, many people imagining that an earthquake had visited the district.
