the corn predominate. Add 2 or 3
medium sized onions to each quart
of the mixture, run through a food chop-
per, mix a portion with an equal am-
ount of bread crumbs, a piece of but-
ter, and -1 egg, season with salt and
pepper, pack in a round baking dish
and bake until brown. Serve in slices
with drawn butter sauce. The mix-
ture may be added to soup stock.

Salted String Beans.

String the beans as for cooking,
pack in stone jars, a layer of beans
and a sprinkling of salt. Pack lightly
and cover, putting a weight on top.To cook next winter, soak the beans
over night in cold water, pour off and
add boiling water and boil for one
hour. Drain, add fresh boiling water
and simmer until tender. Serve with
butter, bacon drippings or white
sauce.

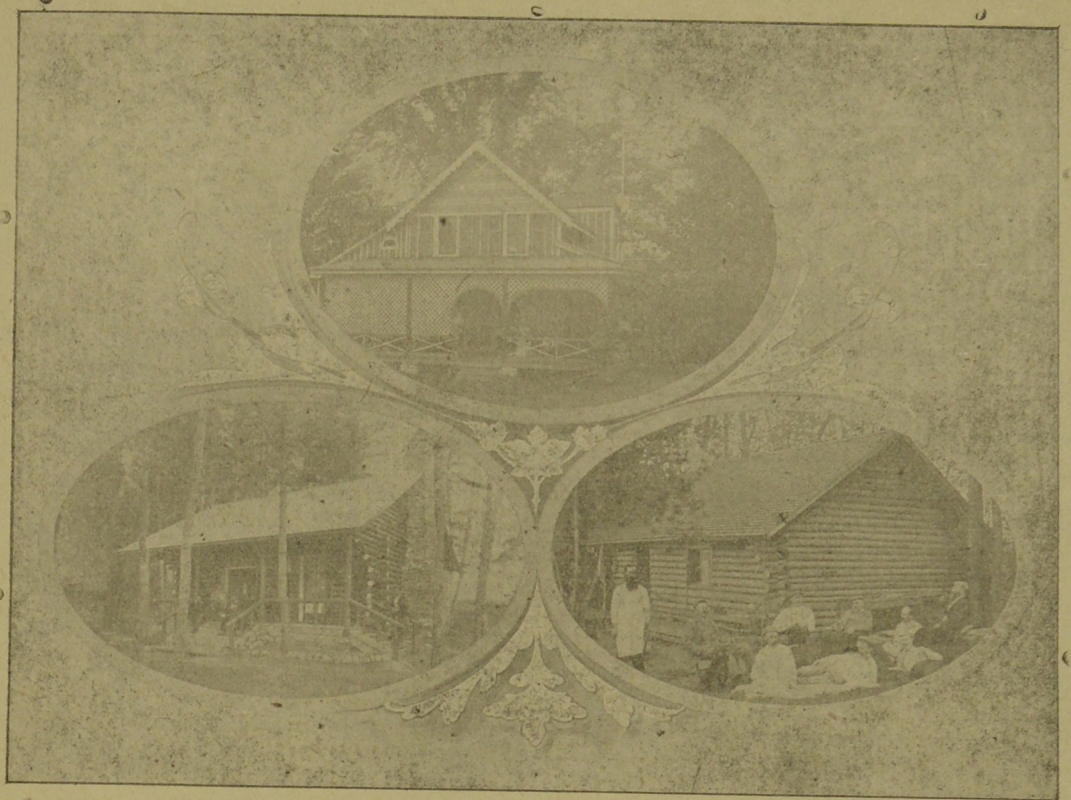
Salted Sweet Corn.

Cut the corn from the cob and mix
it with salt, allowing 1 pint of salt to
a gallon of corn. Put the corn in a
sterilized cheesecloth bag, pack in a
crock and cover with a plate. Be-
fore cooking soak 1 hour in fresh
water, drain and cover with boiling
water, boil 1 hour, drain, add more
boiling water and when the corn is
tender serve with melted butter.

Pickled Corn and Beans.

Cooks who like sauerkraut often
prepare corn and beans by a pickling
process. Put whole ears of corn, or
corn cut from the cob, or string beans,
into a clean sack and suspend in a
barrel of brine. The corn ferments
and gives an acid product.

NEW WAY TO COOK ONIONS.

A Complete and Delicious Meal for
Luncheon.Slice one bunch of onions. Mix with
one cupful chopped celery. Cook intwo and a half cups of milk. Boil
six minutes without covering.Scald one and one-half quarts of
milk, add first mixture and cook for
three-quarters of an hour. Cook three
cupfuls of potatoes cut in 3-4 inch
minutes. Drain and add to milk.Melt two tablespoons of butter in
a skillet. Add milk taken from the
top of the potatoes and stir well,
then add to entire mixture. Season
with salt, pepper and a few grains
of cayenne if liked. All one respon-
