### GIANTS EVEN UP IN THE SERIES; FABER BATTED OUT OF THE BOX BY NEW YORK PLAYERS THURSDAY

Score was 5 to 0—Only Error Made by New York—Benny Kauff Drove in Three Runs, with Two Home Runs—Schupp Shut White Sox Out—Teams Left for Chicago Last Night.

New York, Oct. 11.—Swinging their war clubs like the cave men of old, the New York Nationals battered their victory over the Chicago Americans here today by a score of 5 to 0. As a result of the second defeat of the White Sox in two days the Giants are travelling westward tonight on even terms with their rivals in the struggle for world series victory. The outcome of the battle for premier baseball honors is as much in doubt as before the series began in Chicago last Saturday. Each team now has two contests and the indications point to a full seven-game drive before either club will admit the supremacy of the other.

The victory of the Giants in the fourth game was the most impressive of the struggle to date, for the National League color bearers excelled both in pitching and with the bat. While the Chicago combination threatened several times they never got a runner beyond third base and the American League team left for the shores of Lake Michigan without crossing the Polo Grounds' home plate in eighteen innings.

Two new diamond heroes leaped to pedestals of fame in the clash today, for Ferdinand Schupp turned the White Sox batters back without a run and Benny Kauff led the batting mass across with two home runs.

The youthful left-hander fully redeemed himself for the vicious sally of the Chicago club in the second game on their home grounds when the Comiskey Park batters drove him from the mound early in the contest, while Kauff, after thirteen hitless trips to the plate, finally found his batting eye and broke through Pitcher Faber for a circuit drive which paved the way for the Giants' onslaught which later was to demoralize the White Sox. The effectiveness of Schupp's hurling and Kauff's batting was sufficient to defeat the American League champions but the scent of victory was contagious and their team mates were but a stride behind them in the rush through the White Sox trenches.

#### Records in Danger.

Only twice in the long history of world series baseball has Kauff's feat of two home runs in one game been duplicated. Before the former batting leader of the Federal League made his two circuit drives the honor was divided between Harry Hooper of the Boston Americans of 1915, and Outfielder Dougherty of the same club, in 1903.

In shutting out the Sox without a run, following a similar feat by Rube Benton yesterday, Schupp also equalled for the Giants' team as a whole, a double shutout which has been scored but few times since the beginning of the present century. In 1908 the Chicago Nationals whitewashed the Detroit Americans twice in succession and in 1905 the Giants of those days shut out the Philadelphia Athletics

four games out of five, while the only victory of the Mackmen was also a shutout by the Indian pitcher, "Chief" Bender.

There was nothing to forecast the sensational developments of today's game in the early innings. For three sessions it was a pitchers' battle between Faber and Schupp with little, if any, advantage on either side. Kauff was third man to face Faber in the Giants' half of the fourth, Burns and Herzog having failed to make first base.

#### Kauff Redeems Himself.

With two out and his record of not a hit in the series in thirteen times at bat, a by-word among the fans, Kauff was desperate. With a ball and a strike called against him, he saw a perfect "groove" ball coming up from Faber's hand and, taking a deep toe-hold in the batter's box, he flung the full weight of his body into the sweep of the bat. There was a terrific crack and the ball flew like a bullet over second base and far onward into centre field.

Amid cheers, Benny, once more the idol of the fans, made the rounds of the bases.

Again in the eighth, with Danforth in the box and Herzog on base, Benny connected with the leather and made it good for four bases, scoring Herzog.

As a result of today's game, the contenders for the world championship title will start in on almost even terms when the fifth game is played in Chicago Saturday.

#### Applause Greeted Giants.

Applause greeted the Giants as they came on the field this afternoon for the fourth contest of the world series. Benton and Robertson, heroes of Wednesday's struggle, came in for cheers. Schupp, Sallee and Peritt took part in the preliminary practice.

No whit disconcerted by yesterday's defeat, the Chicago fans gave their club a rousing cheer as the Sox walked across the field. "There is plenty of fight in us," said Eddie Collins. "Watch us today."

The White Sox took their batting practice after the Giants. Manager Rowland sent out left hander Williams to give the Sox their hitting workout. Faber was the only Sox heavier to take his turn at the bat.

The batteries today were: Schupp and Rariden for New York, and Faber and Schalk for Chicago. John Collins played right field and Jackson left field.



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## SIMLER LOST TO YOUNG BRITT

Boston, Oct. 10. — Young Britt of New Bedford was given the decision over Chick Simler of Scranton in their 12-round bout at the Armory A. A. last night.

After the opening session it was plain that the whalings Simler received here from Dundee and Jackson had made him easier game. He caught Britt on the jaw with the right, staggering him, but Britt covered up so well that he pulled through. After that Britt hit him about as he liked.

Simler hit Britt often enough, but there was no steam in the blows.

The semi-final between Shaver O'Brien of South Boston and Banty Lewis of New York was a good bout. Both fought hard all the time, each scoring a knockdown. O'Brien was given the decision at the end of eight rounds.

In the opening contest J. Mack and Charley Miller went six rounds to a draw. Nate Segal of Revere defeated Sam Bell in six rounds.

Billy Miske and Kid Norfolk will box in the feature bout next Tuesday night. George Robinson and Joe Rivers of Gloucester will meet in the semi-final.
