Recipes Which Call for a Minimum Number of the "Gems."

Cornstarch Pudding.

To make a very delicious cornstarch pudding flavored with caramel, stir 2 cupfuls of granulated sugar over a low flame until it is dark. Be careful not to burn it, but simply get it to the caramel stage. Then add, stirring all the time, a half cupful of boiling water and stir until all the caramel is dissolved. Add two cupfuls of milk and pour into a double boiler and when hot add a tablespoonful of granulated sugar mixed with four tablespoonfuls of cornstarch dissolved in two tablespoonfuls of water. Cook the whole three-quarters of an hour and mould. Serve with cream.

Salad Dressing.

Beat ¾ cupful of cream which has been liberally seasoned with salt and paprika, and when it is stiff add two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice or two tablespoonfuls of made horseradish.

Layer Cake.

Break two eggs into a cup and fill

the cup with rich milk. Pour this into a bowl and add 1½ cupfuls flour sifted twice, with ½ teaspoonful of salt, a cupful of granulated sugar and three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Mix thoroughly; the more you mix it the smoother will be the grain. Then add five tablespoonfuls of melted butter. Bake in three small or two large layers.

A Good Omelette.

A good omelette can be made by adding a cupful of fine, soft bread crumbs to an ordinary four-egg omelette mixture. The crumbs should be moistened with as much milk as they will absorb. This addition increases the size of the omelette wonderfully, and of course the milk and bread crumbs add to the nutritive value too.

Columbus, O., April 5.—The Red Sox arrived here tonight from Indianapolis, where the game with Brooklyn today was stopped by rain.

The most important happening of the day was the signing of Harry Hooper after a conference with Pres. Frazee this morning, which lasted more than an hour. Hooper said he was satisfied, and while Pres. Frazee has declared right along that there was no difference over money, it is not believed they spent all that time chatting about Dutch Leonard's prospects of getting a good market for his raisins.

WILLARD NOT EXPECTED TO NOTICE FRED FULTON

There is little likelihood now that Jess Willard will seriously consider a challenge from Fred Fulton. The latter's showing in his bout with Carl Morris, a pronounced second rater, last night was anything but imposing and the champion will probably scratch the name of the Minnesota scrapper off his book as a result.

Fulton took a bad beating according to all accounts, for four rounds, and then deliberately fouled his opponent. His inability to cope with the massive and sluggish Morris came as a great surprise, as he has been cleaning up with great regularity in previous contests. Fulton has size and weight, but not class. It is quite evident that Willard's crown is in no danger as far as Fulton is concerned.

STANLEY CUP GAMES BROUGHT LITTLE CASH TO MEN ON TEAMS

Poor Crowds Turned Out at Seattle To See Metropolitans and the Canadiens.

It is hardly to be wondered at that the Seattle and Canadian hockey clubs went on an exhibition tour to try and get a little extra money, as the recent world's series contests at Seattle were not very brilliant from a financial standpoint, and the players only gathered in a little over one hundred dollars apiece.

Approximately 12,000 persons attended the four games and the receipts were slightly in excess of \$12,000.

With the expenses of the visitors deducted and 30 per cent. to the arena, and 10 per cent. to the leagues, there was a trifle under \$3,000 to split up among the players on the teams. The players only shared in three games, according to the statement issued in Seattle, the total receipts for which were approximately \$9,000. The Seattle club, the winner, drew down \$1,800, while \$1,200 went to the Canadiens.

In round numbers \$180 as his share of the winners' end of the world's championship series purse was handed each of the Seattle players, ten in number, including Manager Pete Muldoon. The Canadiens, on the losing end, were given approximately \$120 each.
