It is deemed advisable that any change in prices by the producers and dealers be delayed until at least after October 31.

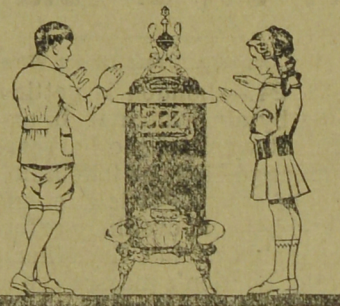

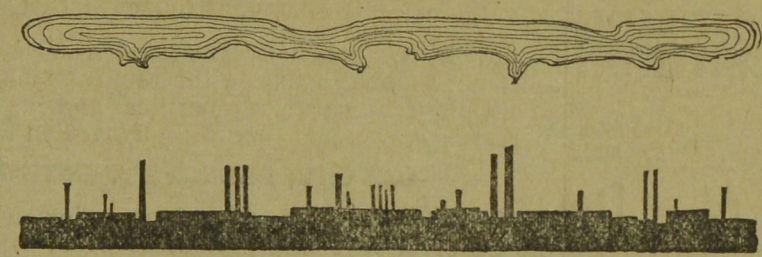
