XMAS PARCELS FOR SOLDIERS

The Central Committee under the I. O. D. E. has received the following communication from the Canadian Field Comforts Commission, regarding Xmas Parcels for our soldiers:

CANADIAN FIELD COMFORTS COMMISSION

Orders for Special Parcels.

The Canadian Field Comforts Commission undertakes the purchase of supplies for parcels to be sent to individual soldiers at the Front.

Parcels from Canada containing biscuits, fruits, home-made sweets, etc., sometimes arrive in stale or spoiled condition.

The purchasing of these parcels in England instead of Canada saves time, economises shipping space and, as the Commission buys from manufacturers and wholesale houses on the most favorable terms, more and better articles can be sent for the same money.

A complete list of names and addresses of soldiers for whom parcels are intended must be sent with order and money to be expended, together with cards or messages to be enclosed in parcels.

Parcels for Canadians in British or foreign units, in the Navy, in hospitals or at private addresses must have postage allowed for.

GREAT LABOR CONGRESS ADJOURNED ON SATURDAY

Many Important Questions Dealt With During the Session--No Drastic Attitude Taken Against Conscription--Increased Pensions for Soldiers is advocated--Officers and Men Should be on the Same Footing.

Ottawa, Sept. 23. — "It is now my duty to declare that the 33rd annual convention of the Trades and Labor Congress of the Dominion of Canada is adjourned."

With these words and a blow of his gavel, President James C. Watters ordered the curtain to be rung down on what has proven to be one of the most momentous occasions in the history of Canadian organized labor. And with these words, incidentally, President Watters brought to a close a session which has run continuously from 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon until past 7 o'clock in the evening.

The final adjournment was remarkably free from any unusual demonstration. In fact, apart from the singing of "Auld Lang Syne," the congress brought the convention to a close exactly as any ordinary daily discussion would close. This was probably due, largely, to the fact that a great many of the delegates took the opportunity to take the afternoon and evening trains back to their homes and thus only a few remained.

The final day was devoted entirely to the cleaning up of the remaining resolutions, hearing the reports of the various committees and so forth. The most impressive and pleasant feature of the day was the presentation of tokens by the congress to Fraternal Delegate John Winstone of Britain; Fraternal Delegate Emanuel Koveleskie of the United States; Miss Alice Henry of the United States; William Lodge, J. P., of Ottawa; Daniel McCann, of Ottawa; and Secretary-Treasurer P. M. Draper. The presentation of a blood-stained bayonet—a Canadian bayonet—direct from Vimy Ridge to President Watters by Fraternal Delegate John Winstone, was particularly impressive.

Action Summarized.

Many matters of importance have been dealt with by the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada during the convention—many resolutions proposed by various local unions, have been adopted. The outstanding features of this convention, however, apart from all other matters pertaining to the progress of the labor movement in Canada, are:

1. The attitude of the Trades and Labor Congress upon the great question of conscription.
2. The adoption of a report advocating increased pay for the soldiers of Canada; increased separation allowance for the dependents of these soldiers; the abolition of the patriotic fund.

fund, the deficiency thus caused to be counteracted by the increased separation allowance; the elimination of discrimination in regard to disabilities money; increased pensions and the general betterment of the soldiers' positions.

3. The adoption of the report advocating the establishment of an independent labor party in Canada, along the lines of the British labor party.

The other measures proposed and adopted at the convention were important, both from a public point of view and from labor's point of view, but the foregoing definite action taken overshadowed in importance all other matters.

On the question of conscription the congress maintained the opposition of labor to this measure, but decided not to take any drastic action to oppose conscription. The proposal of a general strike remained as being a proposal.

On the question of soldiers' pensions the congress advocated an increase for privates of \$2 per diem, an increase in the pay of non-commissioned officers in proportion; and increase in the separation allowances of approximately 60 per cent.; the abolition of the patriotic fund in keeping with the increased allowance; an elimination of discrimination in disability money—officers to receive the same amount as privates or vice versa for total disability—\$100 a month to be the amount irrespective of rank.

On the question of an independent labor party, the congress voted unanimously to support this move, as far as Canadian labor is concerned.

Movement Makes Progress.

Throughout the entire convention it was obvious that great progress has been made in the labor movement in Canada. The report of the secretary-treasurer, showing a substantial credit as far as the congress is concerned and the reports of the executive committee of each province, all demonstrated that the past year has been an important one in the history of labor.

What next year holds for Canadian labor circles can best be described in the words of one of the Quebec delegates, who was content to shrug his shoulders and remark: "Nous Verrons."

SIR GEO. PERLEY'S SUCCESSOR
