## Injured by Dynamite.

Saturday afternoon while a number of C.P.R. laborers under Foreman L. Phillips were engaged in blasting a trench through a ledge of rock near the station at Harvey, two of their number, Willis Hay of Harvey, and James McNevin, a Nova Scotian, were severely hurt by an explosion of dynamite. The men were drilling into the rock and had got down about a foot when the drill struck a charge of dynamite which seems to have been left there unexploded by a gang who blasted there about two years ago. Both men were rendered unconscious for a time. Hay had his arm badly torn and his face cut, and McNevin's face was badly bruised and his eyes injured. Dr. Dougan attended to the injured men.

USED IN UPPER  
GAGETOWN ROW

**Examination of Boyd Brothers, Charged With Assault on Paul Briggs, Began on Saturday.**

Evidence was taken at Gagetown Saturday before Stipendiary Magistrate T. Sherman Peters in the Briggs assault case and the case was adjourned until Saturday next for further evidence. The accused were three Boyd brothers, of Upper Gagetown. Mr. A. J. Gregory, K.C., of this city, appeared for the accused, Mr. P. J. Hughes for the informant and Mr. John R. Dunn for the Crown.

## Informant's Statement.

The statement made by the informant, Paul Briggs, a resident of Upper Gagetown, was to the effect that one of the accused called him out of a store at about nine o'clock on the night of Saturday, September 8th. After some words passed between the two, Boyd attacked the informant and was aided by his two brothers. Briggs defended himself as best he could and after a short time ran into Estabrooks' store. There he was followed by the three and the fight resumed. Others standing near became involved in the trouble and a general row ensued in which some colored men took Briggs' part.

## Serious Wounds.

Evidence was to the effect that the fight assumed serious proportions, show cases and other fittings of the store being broken. Pitchforks were used as weapons by those engaged and several of the combatants received more or less serious wounds, but it has not been brought out in evidence how they were inflicted.

**Provincial Board of Health Has Received Notice of Some New Cases—Smallpox Situation.**

Dr. R. H. McGrath, secretary of the Provincial Board of Health, reports that within the past week several cases of infantile paralysis have developed in the province. One of these is at Campbellton and the others at Grand Falls. At the latter place two cases were reported some days ago. The others have developed since. All Boards of Health are doing their utmost to control the dread disease and prevent its spread.

## Precautions Advised.

Parents anywhere in the province will do well to investigate and have immediate medical attention given to all cases of violent illness in children, with sudden pains in the neck and feverish symptoms.

## No Smallpox.

The situation in the province as far as smallpox is concerned is now satisfactory, according to Dr. McGrath's statement, no cases now being under quarantine.

## Going to Ottawa.

Dr. McGrath will leave tonight for Ottawa, where he will attend the convention of the Canadian Public Health Association. While in Ottawa he will attend the various meetings of the Anti-Tuberculosis League and gather information and data which can be used in this province in the campaign against the white plague.
