

NEW LIFE SAVING DEVICE TO BE USED ON THE SEA

Canadian Inventor Has Secured Patents in Fourteen Countries of the World--Has Been Tested Before the Royal Humane Society and Before Various Swimming Associations and Proved Satisfactory.

Montreal, Sept. 26. — That Great Britain and France show their interest to all development of science designed to provide more security and protection for their sailors, soldiers and travellers on the ocean is found in the fact that special invention committees have been instituted by two nations to investigate devices submitted to them by inventors.

The fact has been emphasized the last week in Montreal, when the Safe on Sea Company was the recipient of two important communications, one from the government of the French republic, the other from the British invention committee.

About a year ago a Canadian inven-

tor secured patents in fourteen of the principal countries of the world on a new life-saving garment, "proof against water, wind and cold," and thus protecting the wearer from exposure and its effects and enabling him to emerge from water warm and dry, notwithstanding cold water and strong wind.

Being considered as a new invention, only, the new device did not draw much attention until demonstrations were made in Canada, and certified by persons prominent in all circles of life.

Experiments were made in the River St. Lawrence by children, males and females of all ages, who volunteered to jump from a steamer into the middle of the river, and remain in the water for hours to emerge perfectly warm and dry.

Such experiments having been made before members of the Royal Humane Society and various swimming associations and proven most satisfactory, apparatus were sent all over the world with the result mentioned above.

The letter received from the French Government by the Company states that the new device S. O. S. has been admitted to compete at the permanent exhibition of life-saving inventions to be held in Paris under the auspices of the Ministry of Arts and Trades and it asks the company to call upon all other inventors in the

same line, to send a model of their invention to the exhibition committee. The British Invention Committee has also sent a special representative and the visitor is now returning perfectly satisfied with the trials to which the S. O. S. device has been subjected.

The Canadian government as well as the United States are also making inquiries into the new invention and for that purpose an opportunity will soon be given to the inventors to test their invention on the rough sea waters.

Arrangements have been completed for demonstrations to be made shortly all through the Maritime Provinces from on board ocean liners.

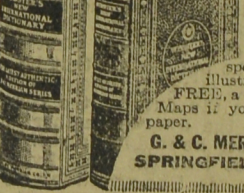

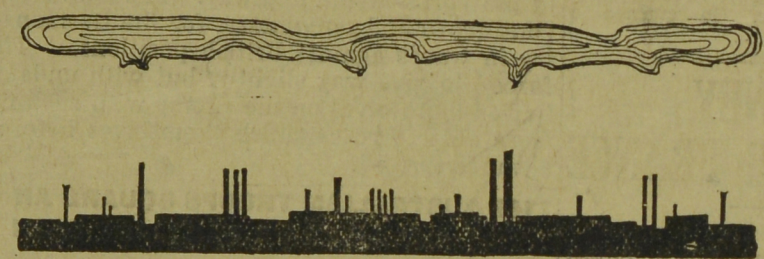
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THE PRICE OF HOMAGE
